Child care problems discussed at Amazon

"I'm extremely optimistic at this point," began Jim Green, Director of Family Self-Support Services. "We have proved that we can plan our programs and develop a method of using our money."

The quality of community children's programs was the subject of a free public discussion Wednesday evening at the Amazon Community Center. Head Start and 4-C's (Community Coordinated Child Care Council) programs were given particular focus at the session which is sponsored by the University's School of Community Service and Public Affairs. The topic of the discussion was "Policy Implementation of Children's Services."

The weekly discussions, or as the group calls them, "The Wednesday Night Fights," is a split panel format. Debatable issues were explored such as the lack of planning in these programs, the inability to put the

money where the programs are, no communication or coordination, and the insufficiency of finding two agencies producing similar functions.

"We need more consideration in planning for human comforts," said Margret Sanstead, from the Seattle Region X Headquarters of the Office of Child Development. "Our governor is trying to coordinate efforts and plans which will help people. It's very important for a state to have resources to help organize when it finally has the financing to coordinate."

"But it's one thing to have an organization and another thing to make it work," added Ruth Edwards, executive director of the Lane County 4-C's. "We are now in the process of making it work."

The primary purpose of the Child Care Coordinating Committee is to strengthen the coordination and orderly development of child care facilities and services in the region, to improve the quality of child care provided, and to develop an assessment of the need for day care and child development programs. The regional 4-C committee is working with the state and local committees to obtain their goal of encouraging the coordination and development programs in the field.

Other speakers included Mike Fishman from the Seattle Region X Headquarters of the Office of Child Development; Janet Chappell, delegate agency coordinator for the Lane County Social Services Division; and Gary Koyen, director of Head Start programs in Eugene, and the surrounding areas.

Wilderness program tonight

The Winter '73-74 Cooperative Wilderness Adventures (CWA) program is kicking off this year's activities with a multi-media presentation and discussion tonight at 7:30 p.m. in 177 Lawrence. The goals, operation and activities of CWA will be the event's focus.

"Cooperative Wilderness Adventures, part of the Outdoor Program, is one of our projects to make low-cost, high adventure trips available," said Bruce Mason, Outdoor Program assistant coordinator. "In CWA, participants as common adventurers work together without authoritarian guides or leaders,

to mold an educational wilderness adventure.

"CWA is a cooperative venture between many schools with this year's adventures slated in 13 western states, Mexico and Canada. Participants can rock-climb in Colorado, snorkel in Hawaii, ski tour in the Cascades, or backpack in Barranca Del Cabre (Mexico)," Mason said.

The Winter CWA brochure has just been published, listing the opportunities of this year's CWA, and is available in the Outdoor Program—EMU room 23. Interested people should attend the presentation tonight, he said.

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
