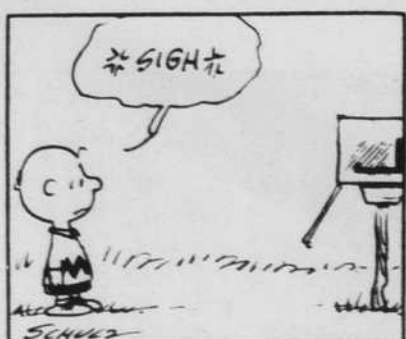

At this time the health center is uncertain how many weeks the shots will be offered.

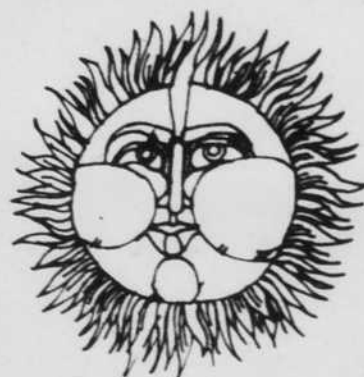
Clergy, laity bond together for peace
