Native Americans complete longhouse

After a year-and-a-half wait, mislaid blueprints and planning difficulties. The Native American Center's Longhouse is finally ready. Located across the parking lot from 15th Avenue and adjacent to Agate Street, it is designed to provide study facilities, a meeting place and an office for the center's advocate. The building was formerly used for counseling offices.

Although it is not completed inside, the remaining work will be done by the students themselves. According to Dennis DeGross, the Native American Advocate, the Indians agreed to do the painting and put up the simpler walls.

"This way we can have it exactly the way we want it," he said. "This building has a good history, there is a good feeling here." Even in its present state of disarray, there has already been a meeting in the building.

The Longhouse will serve as a focal point for the University and the surrounding Indian community. DeGross said it would provide a cultural backdrop for Native American Students.
