

Planning for EMU tavern nears end following poll

Plans for constructing and operating a tavern on campus moved another step closer to completion yesterday when the ASUO released the results of a beer preference poll taken during registration last week.

Chief tavern proponent Jim Bernau, ASUO president, revealed that 2,179 students were asked to choose their favorite beer from a list of 13 locally-distributed beers. Budweiser won with a 28 per cent preference.

Second and third choices were Michelob and Olympia respectively. Hamm's, Heidelberg, Lucky and Old Milwaukee tied for last place with two per cent each.

The ad hoc committee, consisting of EMU Director Adell McMillan and six University students, has already given its approval to the tavern proposal.

However, OLCC officer Ken Whitlock of the Eugene enforcement division explained that an applicant must show that a need exists for an additional outlet in an area.

Each student polled was asked to make two selections. Sixty-two per cent of those polled were over 21.

Bernau explained that the information obtained from the poll will be turned over to the Ad Hoc Committee on the EMU Tavern to aid them in their selection of a brand.

He also pointed out that any action beyond the planning stage is contingent upon University Pres. William Boyd's approval of the tavern proposal and the issuance of an Oregon Liquor Control Commission (OLCC) license.

In the past Pres. Boyd has indicated that he is opposed to the idea of a tavern on campus but that he is willing to review the proposal.

Gerald Bogen, University vice-president for student affairs, questioned as to whether or not he supported the tavern proposal, stated that he had no objections to a tavern on campus.

However, he stressed, "I am not in favor of a university running a tavern. It really depends on the nature of the proposal. We'll be glad to look at and critique any plan the ASUO wants us to."

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However, OLCC officer Ken Whitlock of the Eugene enforcement division explained that an applicant must show that a need exists for an additional outlet in an area.

"Our first step is to determine if the area is already adequately served by existing outlets," he said.

He added that after his office has investigated the applicant, their report will be forwarded to the commission's office in Portland.

Today deadline for L-COG fellowship form

The Lane Council of Governments (L-COG), in cooperation with the University, is offering seven graduate fellowships with L-COG for the 1975-1976 academic year. The deadline for application is today.

The fellowships, which carry a stipend of \$3,600 each, require 20 hours of service a week with the agency. L-COG is an association of 25 local governments. It conducts multi-discipline planning and coordination activities in the Lane County area.

Five of the fellowships are for work in the field of Community Development Services. This area includes transportation, land-use and housing, environmental quality and economic development. The other two fellowships are for work in agency's management area, which includes fiscal affairs, public affairs and regional clearinghouse activities.

Eligible applicants must be graduate students who are pursuing a program of nine credit hours per quarter. However, doctoral students are not eligible. Preference will be given to minorities and low income students. The program is funded two-thirds by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, and one-third by L-COG.

Other specific eligibility information and application forms may be obtained from the office of Dr. John Kerrigan, chairer, Department of Public Affairs and International Development, in the University School of Community Service and Public Affairs.

This is the third year of operation of the cooperative UO/L-COG program.



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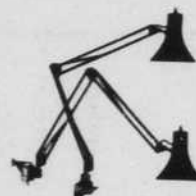


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
