## ASUO slates elections

The ASUO Executive announced the dates of the fall elections for Incidental Fee Committee and EMU Board positions today.

Petitions, which are statements announcing candidacy, are now available in Suite 4 EMU. The last day petitions will be accepted is Friday Oct. 17.

Three two-year positions are open on the EMU Board and all seven IFC positions will be chosen this election.

Primary election dates are set for Tuesday and Wednesday Oct. 28 and 29, and the general election is slated the following week on Nov. 4 and 5.

Kirby Garrett, ASUO vice-president, announced the appointment of Jon Kvistad as 1975-76 elections board chair. "I'm still searching for two other Board members committed to administering the elections fairly and impartially," said Garrett.

Garrett also stated, "Pres. Bernau has indicated his intent to place several proposed constitutional amendments on the ballot. He has yet to submit the specific proposals to me however."

In addition freshman class officers (president, vice-president and secretary/treasurer) will be chosen at the upcoming elections.

## Oldsters form group

A new non-profit corporation designed to promote the rights of older Oregonians has sprung up in the Eugene community.

The corporation, named the Oregon Senior Citizen's Center of Politics and Community Services (OSCCPCS) will serve as an umbrella organization to coordinate the many community projects of a political and social nature that involve older people in Lane County and the state.

These projects will include the operation of a nursing home hotline, a volunteer program, voting reports, a nutritional education program, issue studies, legislative research and the corporation will also issue studies and conduct legislative research.

The organization's executive director is Jim Davis, currently ASUO vice-president and the director of Friendship With The Elderly, Inc. A five member board of directors has agreed to manage the corporation.
