

Survey shows ecology class demands

University undergraduate students desire more "environment-related" courses, according to a survey taken last spring. A draft report on the un-

dergraduate curriculum task force survey states that University students "would be very receptive to expanded and coordinated environmental studies provided they were more practical, field-oriented and personalized than previous opportunities have been."

As to types of courses needed, students expressed the most interest in field work or small lecture classes. In-depth specialized courses and environmental concentration in a major field were preferred over general survey courses.

In evaluating "concentration options" which might be available through existing departments on the campus, "special problems" and "land-use planning" rated highest in interest, with "human ecology" and "resource management" close behind. The "special problems" course was defined as "an independent studies option with possibilities such as alternative energy, population and consumer affairs."

A final report on the survey findings will be published later this fall by the task force.

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Student Services opens new office

A new orientation office has been established under the directorship of Neil Murray, former assistant dean of student services. Working with Murray on a part time basis will be David Zumwalt, who will also continue in his present capacity as an assistant dean within the Student Services structure.

The new office according to Murray, will serve as a unit to coordinate the entire process of all student orientation. In the past, groups such as EORP (Early Orientation and Registration Program) and the Student-Faculty Orientation Committee have functioned under different leaders at different times. Though Murray claims they have done a good job, he feels by being under one roof the University will be better equipped to handle these organizations. Other services that the office provides are foreign student orientation and the Life Long Learning Program, which is a service designed to aid the older members of the community who attend the University.

According to Murray, the new office will be financed by already existing money within the Student Services' budget. Though an exact figure could not be obtained, Murray said like most University programs, the new office would not be overfinanced.

So perhaps next year we won't see glassy-eyed freshmen wandering around campus, bumping into lightposts. Maybe there's even an outside chance of hearing a new speech while sitting in the balcony of Mac Court at registration.

The new orientation office is located in Room 164, Oregon Hall.

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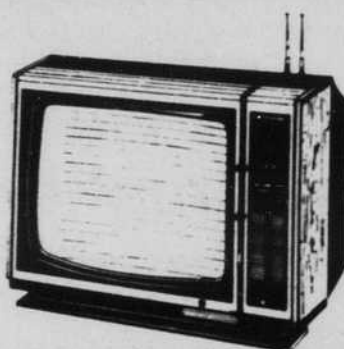
