

Anti-pollution device acquired

"What is it?"
"It looks like some sort of bomb to me."
"Maybe it's that UFO that's going to take those 20 people to a better life."

All of these descriptions fit the huge, gray hunk of steel lying behind the boilers at the University Physical Plant. Actually, it is the first piece of a new pollution-control device awaiting installation.

Called a dry scrubber, the device, says Harold Babcock, Physical Plant director, will clean up the smoke from the boiler stacks in order to meet and exceed present Department of Environmental Quality standards. It will also allow the University to run its boilers at full capacity.

The unit removes fly ash from the smoke by filtering through pea-sized gravel which moves in a slow, continuous circle through the scrubber. The ash is then screened out of the gravel and disposed of.

The smoke passes out through a stack, then runs through a heat conversion unit which lowers the temperature of the smoke from 500 to 300 degrees. Babcock explains this heat recovery device

is part of an energy saving program. The heat can be used to pre-heat the water going into the boilers so it will take less energy to bring the water to boil.

Also in an attempt to save energy, Babcock explained, the scrubber will be powered by a steam-turbine engine. He said since the steam from the boilers is right there, it should be taken advantage of.

The purpose of the picket, according to EFFW member Kurt Wilcox, is "mostly just to let the public know that the boycott is still going on." Waremart stocks non-United Farmworkers lettuce, grapes and wine.

Waremart officials refused to comment on the picket.

EFFW originally planned a picket of the Fred Meyer store on River Road, but the Fred Meyer chain settled with the United Farmworkers last week and removed non-union stock from their shelves, Wilcox says.

Fred Meyer's action was "directly related to picketing" in Portland and Seattle.
