In 1971, Harry Alpert, vice-president for academic affairs and provost, told a faculty meeting, "academic advising stinks around here." Alpert went on to say that "Bev Fagot, director of academic advising, said it was the worst mess she had ever seen."

Why the trouble with academic advising? It stemmed from the kind of problem the University administration would like to have these days. For Gerald Bogen, then vice-president for student services, now vice-president for student affairs, commented that the advising woes came because the University failed to plan adequately for the largest freshman class in its history — some 200 freshmen larger than the previous academic year.

Bogen also said that he was considering the possibility of instituting computerized registration at the University. There hasn't been much progress in that direction in the last four years, for University Pres. William Boyd made an almost identical statement to the *Emerald* just two weeks ago.

Elsewhere on the same Thursday, Oct. 21, 1971 front page, the University community learned that Ian More, then ASUO president, had protested plans to convert Straub Hall, then an old dormitory, to psychology department office space — a plan that is now nearing completion.

More cited a provision in the Oregon Constitution which bans floating state bonds except to build "facilities that appear to be fully self-supporting or self-liquidating." The state floated bonds to build Straub Hall in 1927. More felt that a dormitory fit the constitutional requirement, but he didn't think an office building would.

The issue was of more than academic interest. More said he feared transforming Straub into an office building would drive rates in the rest of the University dormitories "artificially high."

If you were a male undergraduate at the University 40 years ago and you didn't want to take ROTC, you were in for a lot of hassle. On Wednesday, Oct. 23, 1935, the *Emerald* published an analysis of the case of just such a student, sophomore Gordon Connelly.

Connelly, who had participated in ROTC his freshman year, returned to the University that fall and was determined to fight the requirement. At first, Carlton Spencer, University registrar, told Connelly that the ROTC

requirement was a State Board policy which no one at the University had the authority to waive.

But Connelly petitioned the faculty committee on military education and asked to be allowed to substitute a course called "Problems of War and Peace" for his ROTC requirement. He said he opposed ROTC because he thought military training had no place in the higher education curriculum.

On Wednesday, Oct. 30, the *Emerald* reported that the faculty committee turned Connelly down. The only grounds for ROTC exemption, the committee said, were conscientious objection and a heavy work load.

University to receive labor grant

The University will receive \$290,000 from the U.S. Department of Labor to educate farmworkers, according to a department spokesman and the Associated Press.

Regional Director James Hughes said the grant was one of 17 made to colleges and universities for the High School Equivalency and College Assistance Migrant programs. Both programs are for migrant and seasonal farmworkers.

Also receiving money is Washington State University. Hughes said that school will receive over \$267,000.
