

ASUO to revive news bureau

In an effort to "get all the information out," ASUO consultant Don Chalmers is working on a

proposal to re-establish the defunct ASUO News Bureau.

This proposal, if approved, will set up an agency to put together a daily ASUO fact sheet announcing committee meetings and findings, results of votes and conferences, and schedules of press conferences to the media. Chalmers believes that the distribution of such information will bring more and better coverage of the ASUO.

"The whole idea is to make a vehicle for all people to communicate together," Chalmers said. "No government can perform very effectively without a means to announce its activities to its constituents on a steady basis." The media, he added, will not be limited solely to the bureau for information. Won't the bureau tend to prevent so-called "negative" publicity? "Clearly, we're going to put our best side forward, as would any government. But the students have a right to hear about something besides the athletic department mess-ups," Chalmers said.

Socialist candidate visits

Socialist Worker Party presidential candidate Peter Camejo will appear Friday at 12:30 p.m. in the EMU 167.

Camejo has been active in the Socialist Workers Party since 1959 and was a leader in civil rights and anti-war movements of the 1960s. In 1970 Camejo unsuccessfully ran for the U.S. Senate from Massachusetts against Ted Kennedy.

Speaking recently about his campaign, Camejo said, "None of the Democratic party's many presidential hopefuls offer any significant alternative to Ford. Working people need their own political party to fight for their interests."

This is not the first time that socialists have visited the University. Andrew Pulley, 1972 vice-presidential candidate,

spoke on campus in November 1971. Pulley, was ineligible for the office because he was only 22 years old at the time. Candidates must be at least 30. The 1972 Linda Jenness-Pulley ticket garnered only 65,290 votes.

University gets grant

The University has received \$290,074 from the U.S. Department of Labor for its High School Equivalency Program (HEP) to help students from migrant or seasonal farmworker backgrounds.

The program provides educational help necessary for participants to pass the GED test for high school equivalency.

A total of 50 students currently are enrolled in the program, which is expected to aid 180 students this year. An average of three months is required to complete the training.

Students from Oregon, Idaho, Northern California, and Nevada are served by the University program, now in its 12th year.

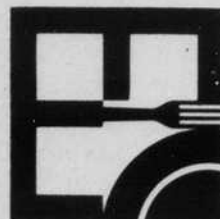
