

Committee on water quality being formed

Does your canoe have a yellow ring around its hull after a trip down your favorite waterway? Are you concerned that various waste water regulations are too strict? If these or similar problems interest you there will soon be a forum available through which to discuss your concerns and opinions.

A citizens advisory committee concerned with water quality problems of the Willamette Basin portion of Lane Council of Governments (L-COG) citizen participation program, is being

organized to assist in the development of an area-wide waste water management program which is being funded under the Federal Water Pollution Control Act.

The committee will be composed of 20 persons who represent areas such as agriculture, industry, wood products, the environment, and recreation. The advisory committee will also assist in the development of area-wide waste water management policies and will be involved in public meetings through which the public's opinions and suggestions regarding waste water pollution will be obtained.

Transportation alternatives topic of hearing

A public hearing on the Eugene-Springfield Transportation Alternatives Study (E-SATS) will be held jointly by the Board of County Commissioners

and the Lane County Planning Commission today at 7:30 p.m. in the Pioneer Building at the Lane County Fairgrounds.

There are six alternatives now being considered by local government agencies in the Eugene-Springfield metropolitan area. These alternatives were developed by staff members of the local governments and the L-COG Citizens Advisory Committee.

A slide showing detailing the six alternatives will be presented at the beginning of the hearing by John Bennet, Lane County Senior Planner.

L-COG Transportation Coordinator William Guenzler, will also attend the meeting. Guenzler was instrumental in designing the six alternatives.
