The Oregon Public Interest Research Group (OSPIRG) has announced the project descriptions for their winter term internships. Interested persons should submit a proposal outlining research or work in one of the following areas:

Nuclear Power and Public Safety-candidates must propose a specific research topic in this area.

Energy Conference Organizer — Candidates will be expected to coordinate logistics and organize the program for an energy conference winter term.

State Water Resources and the Impact of Large-Scale Irrigated Farming — Work in this area will involve research on the impact of corporate farming in Oregon.

ASUO plan gets AOSL endorsement

An ASUO-sponsored proposal for the publication of student evaluations of faculty has been unanimously endorsed by the Associated Oregon Student Lobby (AOSL) executive board.

The endorsement was made this past weekend at an AOSL meeting held on the Eastern Oregon College campus in La Grande.

Kirby Garrett, ASUO vice-president and AOSL executive board chairman, will present the proposal before the Oregon State Board of Education on Nov. 25.

Garrett called the AOSL endorsement "significant."

The executive board also unanimously passed a proposal to raise the membership fee for the seven schools in AOSL. Starting next year, the fee will be increased from 36 cents to 50 cents per fulltime student.

Nuclear pact to be filed

A completed initiative, tagged the Nuclear Safeguards Act, will be filed with the Attorney General in Salem Monday. If the initiative has the minimum number of signatures, (46,000) it will be assigned a measure number in order to place it on the ballot of the November 1976 general elections.

Oregonians for Nuclear Safeguards, a statewide partnership of citizen groups, is sponsoring the initiative.

The proposed Nuclear Safeguards Act is seeking assurances of safety, rather than a moratorium on plant construction.

The act proposes three assurances from the government and nuclear industry if nuclear development is to continue in Oregon:

— Regulation of plant safety systems, especially the emergency core cooling system.

— Regulation of handling and storage of nuclear wastes.

— Insurance protection to home-owners in case of a nuclear accident.

EWEB bond okayed

Voters Tuesday approved a \$15 million water bond issue of the Eugene Water and Electric Board (EWEB).

Only nine per cent of the voters in the district showed up at the polls. No tax money was involved.

According to EWEB General Manager Keith Parks, the funds

will be used to construct a sixty-inch water main from the Hayden Bridge Filtration Plant to Highway Interstate Five, from which smaller mains will be built around Eugene; to build pump stations and reservoirs; and to lay concrete structures for three new filters completing one during the first phase of construction.

Oil cartel discussion set

"Living with OPEC" will be the topic of a panel discussion tonight, sponsored by the Undergraduate Economics Forum.

Economics professors Henry Goldstein and Robert Smith and graduate student Anwar Jabarti will join Liston Hills, former officer of the Arabian-American Oil Company, to discuss the

impact of the oil cartel on the world economy. The panel will also explore alternative energy policies for the oil importing nations.

Lane Community College professor Paul Malm will moderate the discussion which will start at 7:30 p.m. Room number will be posted.

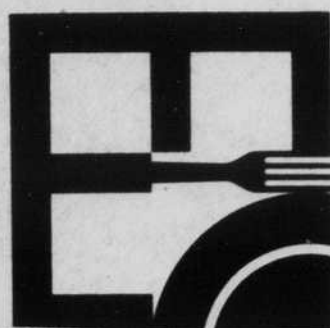
