

AFSCME charge decision delayed

that although the charge is filed against the University, "we are not in a defensive posture." Though he admitted that they were "stuck" with the actions of University supervisors, he did stress that "we gave no specific authorization to any of our supervisors to take part in the OSEA-AFSCME election."

In order to convince the ERB to sustain the complaint, AFSCME counsel Ted Kulongoski had to prove that supervisory personnel actively participated in the VOTE OSEA campaign. He called several witnesses to swear under oath to events preceding the Oct. 15 election.

Kulongoski's first witness, University employe Anna Sue Hollister, said that as a member of the bargaining unit representative committee for classified staff, she merely "worked to get all people out to vote regardless of their choice (of unions)". She did contend that she passed out OSEA campaign materials, although she is on the University's excluded list as a supervisor.

Kulongoski strove to further prove his point by calling Cathy Campbell to the stand. Campbell works in the main office of the campus computer center.

During her testimony, Campbell revealed that her immediate supervisor, Gus Pusateri, had told her and her co-worker that "Hopefully you will vote and hopefully it will be for OSEA." She further stated Pusateri had distributed the OSEA newsletter to the office staff, while not distributing AFSCME news.

Campbell said Pusateri would occasionally point out things in favor of OSEA over AFSCME, and that she was neither influenced by her supervisor's action nor

fearful of any reprimand from him should she vote against OSEA.

Kulongoski next called John Evans to the stand. Evans is a maintenance foreman in the University Physical Plant. He is a former OSEA president and vice-president.

Evans stated he had not campaigned for OSEA in this election, and never told anyone to vote for OSEA. He did admit to distributing OSEA buttons and literature as they came in, but not to his workers personally. The material was distributed in a box below the workers' time boxes, for them to look at if they chose. Evans also said he distributed AFSCME materials in the same way.

"I tried to remain neutral at all times," said Evans. "I never urged them (his employes) to vote one way or the other." He added that he didn't take his employes to the polls — he just put a notice on the bulletin board to vote.

In later testimony, Evans said he received a letter at work from the office of Jack Steward, director of University personnel urging him to get his workers out to the polls. But, he said, the letter did little good, as it didn't arrive until 4:20 p.m. the day of the vote. Steward interjected that the letter was intended to be out for the Friday before the election.

Kulongoski's fifth witness was Velma Mullaley, OSEA building representative for Prince Lucien Campbell hall. Although she knew she was an excluded employe, she voted anyway and her vote has been challenged by the ERB.

She said she distributed literature to her employes and put posters up as they came in. "At no time did I do

any active electioneering," she said. "But I hoped I'd be identified with OSEA."

She said she and her co-workers had informally discussed the election, but she claims she never told anyone how to vote. Other workers knew her stand, she said, as she wore an OSEA button and was active in their meetings. The discussions were just general in nature, she says, and everyone simply traded opinions.

Steward also took the stand, and said he knew nothing about the brewing controversy until he received a copy of a letter from Jeff Schrader of AFSCME to Morton Shapiro of OSEA, detailing the substance of the complaint.

Steward said he called two of the employes mentioned in the letter (including Pusateri) and asked what they had done. According to Steward, they both said they did nothing illegal.

Steward said his office contacted all the University employes to vote, but in no way tried to persuade their opinions. And, he added, OSEA asked Steward's permission to contact the employes, and he set it up for them. He said no such request was received from AFSCME.

Steward said that while he currently is not an OSEA member, he did receive a strike ballot from them and did vote in that election.

If the AFSCME complaint wins the approval of the ERB, a new representation election will be held. If the complaint fails however, the results of the Oct. 15 election are valid, and OSEA retains the sole bargaining rights for the employes.
