His talk will center around a statement made in "Tales of Power," a book by Carlos Castaneda: "What matters ... is arriving at the totality of oneself."

Emery and his wife Joelle live in Loveland, Colo. and spend much of their time traveling across the continent speaking to doctors and nurses, students, service organizations, social workers, businessmen and drug counselors. They address subjects such as "The Joy of Encountering You," "You and I Are More Than OK," "Hope for the Flowers and Everything Else" and "Jonathan Livingston Seagull and Your Essential Self."

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WILPF favors disarmament

International President of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom (WILPF), Kay Camp, recently returned from the World Congress for International Women's Year in East Berlin. She worked to prevent the Congress from adopting a resolution condemning Zionism similar to the resolution passed by the United Nations in November.

"We deplore it," Camp said of the U.N. resolution, "We think it is divisive and unfair." She said the WILPF supports the right of both Israel and Palestine to exist, and believes Israel should return to its 1967 borders.

The WILPF supports mediation in the Middle East, although Camp says, "We regard the Sinai agreements with some skepticism." She says the United

States "seems to have bought this agreement."

The principal aims of the WILPF since its establishment in 1915 are disarmament, peace and equality for women. The WILPF is currently campaigning for a U.N. disarmament conference, a proposal the United States has ignored.

Camp represented the WILPF at the International Women's Year Tribunal in Mexico City last June. She said that "Women from developing nations are not as concerned about equal pay for equal work, as they're concerned about getting milk for their babies."

Third World women "tend to feel disarmament is our problem," but that development is impossible while the world's resources are being spent on defense. "It is important that women become involved in the

planning of development," Camp says. "Women are the most dynamic force for potential change."

The WILPF has an active lobby in Washington which is working to convince legislators of the advantages of disarmament. Their most urgent lobbying priority, however, concerns Senate Bill One, the proposed Federal Criminal Code. The WILPF has fought the bill since it was first drafted, objecting to the restrictions of civil liberties the bill would allow.

The WILPF was founded in 1915 by Jane Adams, the first woman to win the Nobel Peace Prize. "We grew out of the early feminist movement," Camp says. "We have always felt that women should be heard from. We are working for the same things we worked for when we started in 1915."
