The Academic Advice and Information Fair will be held today from 2:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. Students with any kind of academic questions or problems are welcome to attend.

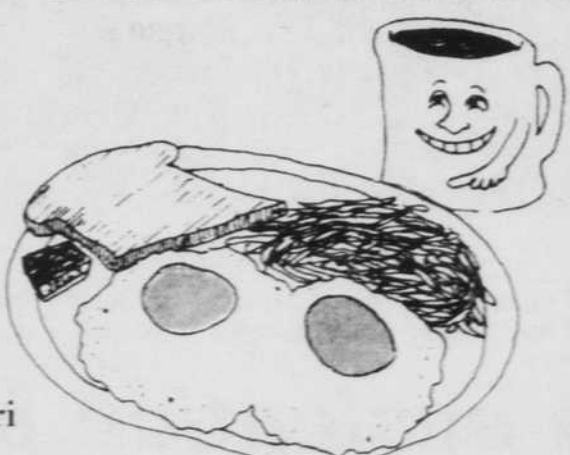

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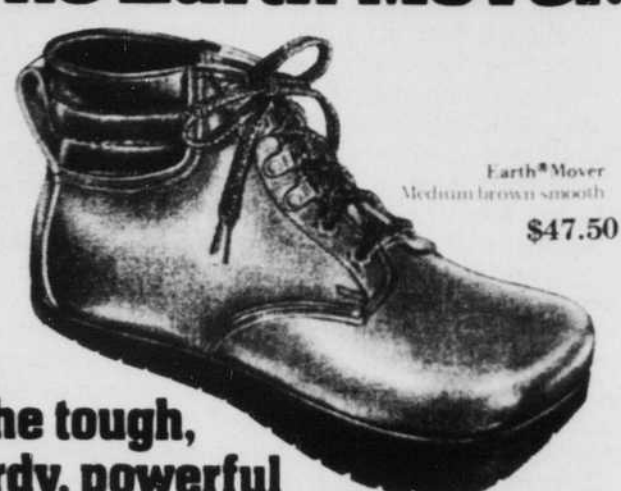
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
