

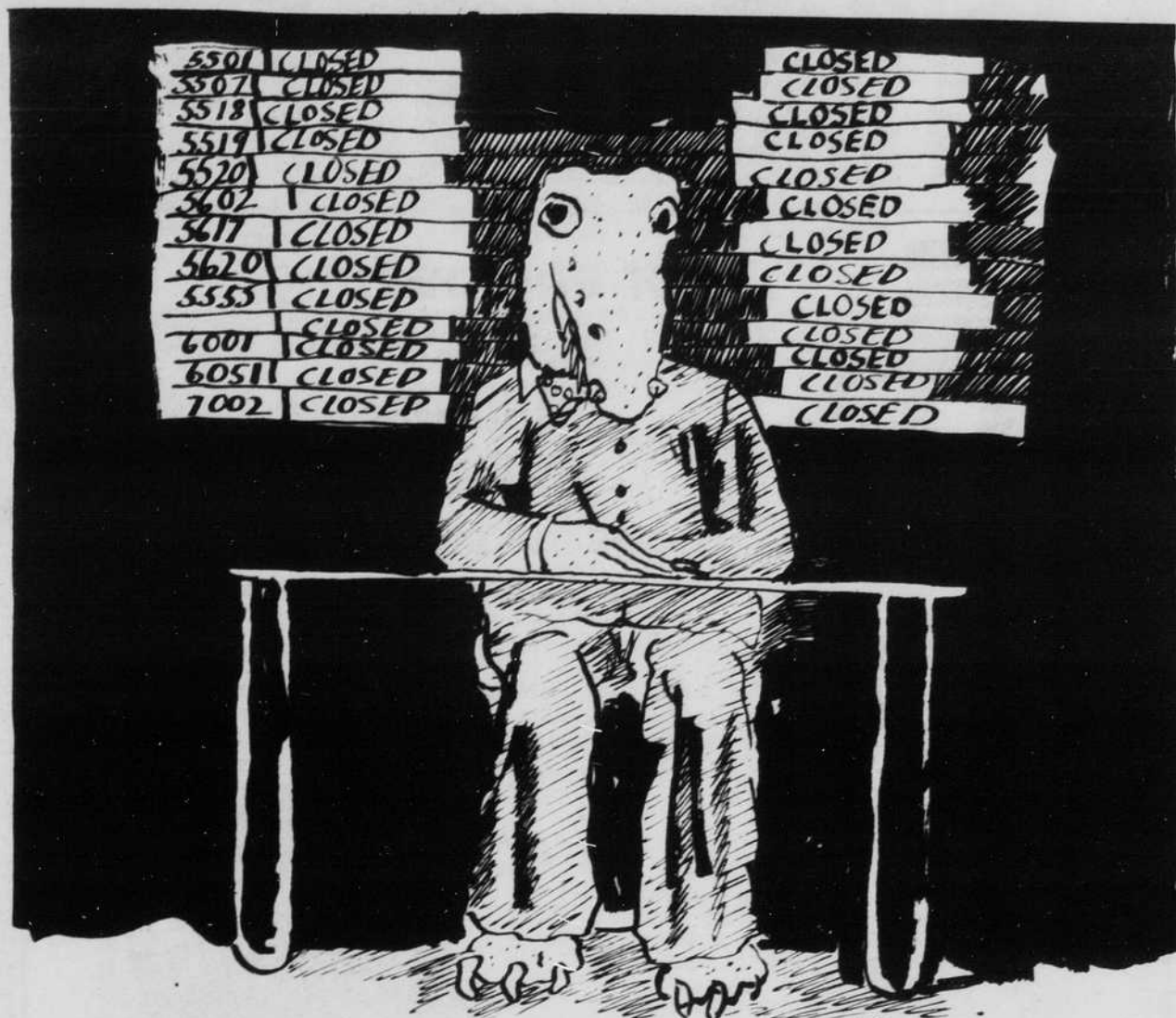
"Hey, no, wait a minute, she never..."

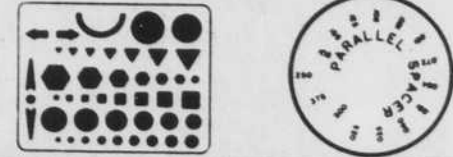
