

Libraries offer respite for studying

On a quiet, rainy winter afternoon, the main library offers a respite for the party-weary, burned out student bent on mending his ways.

This large brick structure is the main resource center on campus, and contains, like most libraries, a large variety of books, journals, magazines and reference materials.

However, the University's entire collection of reference materials is

not stockpiled in this one building. Various libraries and resource centers are scattered around campus. If a student is unsure which library a specific book is housed in, index files in the main library list all materials available and where to find them.

The law library is located at the west end of the new law building. Although the library has come under fire recently because of a lack of funds to maintain its quality, it has the most complete

collection of legal reference materials available to students in the Eugene area.

The science library is located beneath the science courtyard, and maintains a large collection of scientific journals. The library's collection serves students in the areas of biology, chemistry, geology, physics and math.

On the second floor of Lawrence Hall, the school of architecture and allied arts maintains a library to provide resource materials for designers, artists and urban planners.

With space to handle about 20 students at a time, the library of

the Bureau of Governmental Research and Services has resource materials dealing with governmental problems at all levels: local, state and federal. The library is located in 130 Hendricks Hall.

Edward Thatcher, University map librarian, says students can drop by the map room, 165 Condon Hall, to find out where just about any place is located. In addition to its extensive collection of maps, the map room also has maps to loan to students planning a journey. Thatcher is more than willing to answer students' queries by phone.

Almost every department has a reading room or department resource center, and an enterprising student can find an unlimited number of nooks and crannies around campus which are right for studying.

A pleasant room to keep in mind is room 206 in the EMU. The room is equipped with a music system and a telephone dial that allows students to pick a record from the posted list. Both classical and jazz selections can be called up with two small twists of the index finger. Musicians listed include Duke Ellington, Kenny Burrell, Bach and Beethoven.

Geologist offers to trace pet rocks' pedigree

PORTLAND (AP)—There's been an avalanche of pet rocks at the Oregon Department of Geology and Mineral Industries.

For \$1, the department has offered to analyze the family background of a pet rock so owners will know just what they have on their hands.

The rocks, plain looking and of modest size, are nationwide bestsellers, bringing prices of up to \$5 or \$6.

"It was wild around here Monday," said Ralph Mason, deputy state geologist. "We got a rock in from Boise Tuesday morning. The owner not only wants a genealogy of his pet rock, but wants it back by return mail."

Mason has worked up a certificate to present to owners after their pet rocks have been analyzed.

It checks of the "genetic" background of the rock igneous, sedimentary, metamorphic as well as its texture, color and shape.

Under "appraisal and comments," the rock owner gets a geological assessment ranging from "you have a very nice rock" to "you got took."

Marital trends change for young

WASHINGTON (AP)—The tendency for American young people to leave home and live alone rather than marry in their early 20s has accelerated in the first half of this decade, a census bureau study showed Tuesday.

The report on marital status and living arrangements in the United States also showed continued trends toward increased divorce and separation, a greater number of families headed by women and more children living with only one parent.

The mid-decade study said, "Just as impressive as the recent increases in the per cent single among the adult population has been the increased incidence of

marital disruption by divorce or separation due to marital discord."

Based on its nationwide annual survey conducted in March, Census said the number of persons between 25 and 34 years of age who never married increased by about 50 per cent since 1970, from 2.9 million to 4.2 million. And the number of persons in that age group heading their own household approximately doubled, from 915,000 to 1.8 million.

As a result, the Census study showed that the number of persons living alone in that age group climbed in the five-year period from 592,000 or 21.2 per cent of the group in 1970 to 1.2 million, or 28.5 per cent of the age group, in 1975.
