

## Films discuss science's role

The graduate students of the University's physics department are sponsoring a series of filmed lectures which deal with the way in which man sees his physical universe.

The Messinger lectures were intended to broaden and enrich the liberal arts education at Cornell University by providing "a course of lectures on the evolution of civilization for the special purpose of raising moral standards." The 1964 lectures, given by Richard Feynman, noble laureate and holder of several teaching awards, look at the general characterization of reality that has evolved in this branch of man's intellectual pursuit.

The free films will be shown on Tuesday nights at 7 in I23 Science and will last approximately one hour. Following is a list of the films and the dates on which they will be shown:

The lectures are designed to bridge the gap between science and the "liberal arts" curriculum of present day universities.

## Vets eligible for state aid

Veterans planning to use state educational aid benefits to attend school this winter should immediately contact their school registrar or veterans' counselor, H. C. Saalfeld, Veterans' Affairs director, said today.

Korean war veterans and recipients of the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal or the Vietnam Service Medal are entitled to the benefits. There is no application deadline. World War II veterans may still be entitled, but only if they started drawing benefits before June 30, 1959, and have remaining entitlement.

The benefit pays \$50 for each month of full-time undergraduate college studies and up to \$35 a month for other studies, based on one month's entitlement for each month of military service, up to 36 months.

## Ford salutes UO Centennial

Pres. Gerald Ford has offered his personal best wishes to the University on the occasion of its Centennial Year observance.

The President's regards were sent in a two-paragraph letter received by University Pres. William Boyd Monday.

The letter says: "As the University of Oregon celebrates its one-hundredth anniversary of service to higher education, I am pleased to commend the people of your state for having created a first-rank institution whose academic accomplishments are recognized throughout the country.

"Your university has become a major national resource for preparing young Americans for useful and rewarding careers and lives of greater self-fulfillment. On this happy milestone, I salute the university community, its alumni and many friends; and I extend my very best wishes for every future success."

The University's first major Centennial activity will be held this weekend. It includes the inauguration of Boyd as the University's 12th president.

## Experiments to study pot's effect on sex

CARBONDALE, Ill. (AP)—Federally financed experiments testing the effects of marijuana on human sexual response—labeled tax-paid debauchery by some opponents—could begin within a week at Southern Illinois University.

A Food and Drug Administration public relations man in Washington said Monday the experiments, to be conducted by Dr. Harris Rubin, have obtained the agency's "go-ahead."

Rubin said in a telephone interview he has been told to expect within a week a response from the Justice Department to his application for a required grant of immunity from prosecution.

"We are prepared to start almost immediately," Rubin said. "We are ready to go. We are ready to start our pilot studies. We have all of our stimuli, except the marijuana."

That will be supplied by the government.

"Actually," he said, "I was never really terribly worried." Sen. Thomas Eagleton, D-Mo., a member of the appropriations committee, spoke against the project as recently as last Friday. He said he had written letters to the

attorney general and the director of the FDA demanding the experiments be dropped and suggesting their budgets would be subjected to close scrutiny for non-compliance.

He said the experiments are irrelevant to the nation's drug problem and are appalling.


U.S. Atty. Henry Schwarz, in whose jurisdiction the school lies, has also called for disapproval of the immunity application.

Rubin, a psychologist who has conducted similar experiments with alcohol, last spring obtained a \$121,000 grant from the federal National Institute of Drug Abuse to administer marijuana to paid male volunteers and measure their arousal as they view stag films. Sex hormone levels will also be monitored.

All of the test subjects, he said, will be current marijuana users of legal age and will be paid \$10 to \$20 a day for their participation.

FDA, which has no power to review the worth or morality of the project, is required to certify that the rights of the participants to privacy were adequately protected and that experimental procedures met professional standards.

Rubin said he received a letter with that certification Monday.
