HCD funding hearings set

The third in a series of public hearings on spending some \$67,000 of federal Housing and Community Development (HCD) funds in Lane County will be held tonight.

The Lane County Board of Commissioners will meet in Harris Hall at 1:30 p.m. to consider projects to be funded by HCD money.

Previously, two public hearings have been held to receive public suggestions about where the money should be spent.

The funds are allocated for improvement of economic and housing opportunities primarily for persons of low and moderate incomes.

Another objective of the federal program is the prevention and elimination of deteriorating conditions that make neighborhoods undesirable places to live.

Examples of projects that might qualify for funding include: housing rehabilitation and repair, sidewalk paving in areas approaching schools, human resource centers, preservation of historic sites, solid waste transfer stations, senior centers and others.

Season tickets available for minor sports

Student awareness of the gymnastic, swimming and wrestling

programs is the goal behind the recent move by the athletic department and the ASUO to make available a winter sports season ticket for admission to all home events of these sports.

The \$4 ticket will also permit entry to the Pacific-8 wrestling championships at Corvallis, February 20-21, the Pacific Northwest gymnastic championships February 20-21, and the Pacific-8 gymnastic championships March 4-6, both at Eugene.

Students were previously required to pay \$1 for each home meet until Pete Wingert, acting athletic director, and ASUO Pres. Jim Bemau got together and decided the move would help promote exposure and student awareness of the programs.

Talk features energy facts

Dr. Walter Youngquist, visiting professor of geology, will be the featured speaker at the Faculty Center Thursday at 4 p.m.

The topic of his speech will be "Energy: the facts."

Youngquist, a geo-thermal expert, teaches two courses this term, including "Energy Mineral Resources for the Future." He is the author of a book entitled "Investing in Natural Resources," and has recently been published in the *Wall Street Journal*.
