

Palestine views aired

"The media in this country do not give both sides to the Middle East Problem," claims Reza Akhlaghi, of the Iranian Student Association. "It has concentrated on Israeli problems, ignoring the real cause of the conflict, the Palestinian people themselves."

In an effort to "correct this," Akhlaghi has coordinated a "Palestine Awareness Week." The seminar, co-sponsored by the Iranian Student Association, the Arab Student Association and the Eugene Coalition, will present the Arab side of the conflict, Akhlaghi says.

The program will include

movies, teach-ins and discussions beginning Monday night, Jan. 19, with two movies entitled "Palestine Occupied" and "Jerusalem in Danger." The following Saturday a dinner featuring Arab food will cap the week. All events will be free, except a \$2 charge per person for the dinner.

Student assistance necessary for dig

Can you dig it?

Archaeology, that is.

The Association for Cultural Exchange is inviting students to help dig up England's past, assisting an international team in excavating the medieval city of Northampton and the Anglo-Saxon cemetery at Spins Hill in Norfolk.

The program is scheduled for next summer, and the deadline for applications is March 1. Students who apply will be expected to be free beginning mid-May, and to have previous archaeological experience. Experienced volunteers will receive free board and lodging.

The association is also seeking students without experience to join the British Archaeology Seminar at Lincoln College, Oxford. Six academic credits can be earned from participating in the program, which concludes with participation on digs in different parts of England and Scotland.

An application fee of \$100 is requested by the association, to be refunded should the applicant not be accepted. The association offers scholarships ranging in value from \$100 to \$200 to college seniors in genuine need of financial aid in order to participate. A cumulative average of B-plus in college work to date is a prerequisite for the scholarships.

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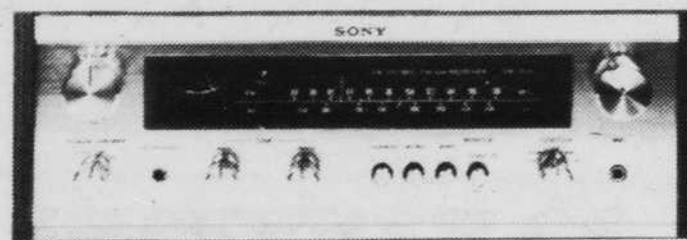


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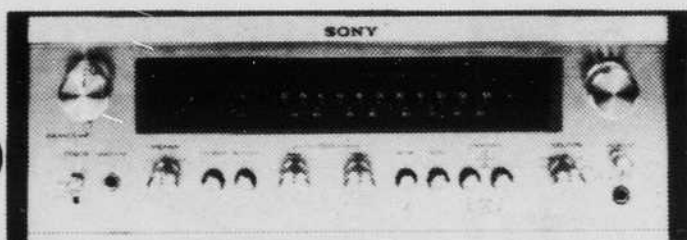
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
