## Tests say Patty an unwilling bandit

NEW YORK—(AP)Three days of lie-detector tests support Patricia Hearst's story that she was terrorized by her kidnapers and forced on pain of death to take part in a bank robbery, the *New York Daily News* said Sunday.

The *News* said in its early Monday editions that it learned of the tests through sources in New York City who are close to the case of the 21-year-old newspaper heiress who was kidnaped by members of the Symbionese Liberation Army nearly two years ago.

The *News* quoted the sources as saying the tests were conducted in San Francisco by four polygraph experts—Charles Zimmerman of the Scientific Security Co. of Boston; Drs. Gordon Barland and David Ruskin of the University of Utah and Dr. Stanley

Abrams of Kaiser Hospital, Portland.

Barland was contacted by The Associated Press but refused to comment on the report.

The *News* said Hearst's attorneys are expected to file an application today with U.S. District Judge Oliver Carter in San Francisco, seeking to have results of the tests admitted as evidence.

Wayne Smith, an associate of Hearst's attorney F. Lee Bailey, refused to confirm or deny the lie detector report but added: "It's all being coordinated in San Francisco and will be released tomorrow."

According to the *News* the sources said the tests indicated Hearst was telling the truth when she said she took part unwillingly in the robbery of a branch of the Hibernia Bank in San Francisco April 15, 1974. She is scheduled to

stand trial Jan. 26 in the case.

The lie detector indicated that her story of being held prisoner in a dark closet for days after the kidnaping was the truth, the *News* said.

## ASUO advisory board begins platform work

The ASUO advisory board will hold its first meeting Tuesday in preparation for beginning work on a legislative platform. The platform will be presented to next year's state legislature.

"This gives us twelve months to prepare proposals to put before the assembly," said Mark Cogan, ASUO administrative assistant for legislative affairs.

Cogan said the advisory board is seeking student participation in helping shape the position statements, and that students will gain experience which may qualify them to work as lobbyists in the state legislature. He said the ASUO hopes to send five to ten student lobbyists to next year's legislature.

The ASUO will work closely with the Associated Oregon Student Lobby (AOSL) in proposing bills pertaining to all the schools in the state system of higher education, according to Cogan. The lobby

was formed last year to tie together the efforts of separate student lobbies, including Oregon and six other state schools.

"The lobby feels a responsibility to act in behalf of students as students," said Cogan. For this reason, he said the lobby gives priority to issues such as tuition, financial aid and student roles in the academic governance of the University.

As evidence of the student lobby's effectiveness, Cogan pointed to a law passed by the last legislature giving students a role in the University collective bargaining process. Oregon is one of only two states with such a law.

Tuesday's meeting is scheduled for 7:30 p.m., room to be posted. All interested persons are invited to attend.
