

Students foil theft attempt

Campus Security was alerted to an attempted second-degree theft Saturday night, but three University students had already apprehended suspect Rodger W. Wyatt, 1644 E. 24th Ave.

The suspect was allegedly rummaging through several coats during a slide presentation at Gerlinger Hall. Nancy Haber approached Wyatt and told him that she was going to call Campus Security, whereupon the suspect attempted to flee the scene.

Haber called for help and Robert Pearson and Robert Getty came to her assistance, grabbing Wyatt.

Haber placed the suspect under citizen's arrest and then called Campus Security.

A spokesman for the Campus Security office said, "That's good — citizen involvement is what stopped him."

When officers arrived they found numerous keys and change in Wyatt's possession.

Campus Security also reported a stolen 10-speed Peugeot bicycle.

Steven Turner, 946 E. 19th Ave. reported that his bike was taken Saturday. He had locked the bike outside the School of Education but hadn't attached it to a post. When Turner returned 15 minutes later his bike was gone.

"You can carry a bike away if it is not attached to something else," said a Campus Security officer. "A lot of people have snap-off wheels. People simply come along and snap off the tire and take the rest of the bike. You have to secure the frame too."
