

# Residency, grievance rules on board slate

Proposed changes in the residency requirements which the State Board of Higher Education will consider today may make it harder for some out-of-state students to gain Oregon residency.

The public will air views on residency requirements and discrimination procedures, and the board will review a revised budgeting system at the Portland meeting.

One of the changes recommended to the full board by the

Committee on Instruction, Research and Public Service Programs removes both age and marital status as factors in determining residency. The present rules allow students over 21 and all married students to gain Oregon residency regardless of whether they are receiving support from parents who live outside of Oregon.

The committee has recommended that all students must be financially independent in order to gain Oregon residency for tuition purposes.

The Committee on Instruction

will also recommend that the full board adopt certain rules setting up complaint procedures for discrimination suits. The ASUO and the Oregon Women's Political Caucus claim, however, that the rules drawn up by the committee are "inadequate and inappropriate."

House Bill 2131, passed in the 1975 Legislature, required the board to establish rules "to eliminate discrimination based on age, handicap, national origin, race, marital status, religion or sex in any higher education program." The instruction committee's rules are the board's answer to the legislation.

The committee proposed a set of discrimination grievance procedure rules to the full board in November, but because of unfavorable testimony by the Women's Political Caucus, the board sent the rules back to committee. The committee revised the rules at its December meeting, and will take those rules to the full board today.

A coalition including the ASUO, the Native American Program, MEChA and the Women's Political Caucus have fought the committee's proposed rules since November. They believe that the revisions made in December were minor ones, and that

the committee paid little attention to their suggestions.

"The board's attitude is not one of progress toward ending discrimination," says Eugene attorney Margie Hendricksen, president of the caucus. "It's more an attitude of 'What's the least we can get by with?'"

Hendricksen says that the committee's recommendations are not in keeping with the intent of the Legislature. She also stresses that the committee's procedural rules do not conform with the Administrative Procedures Act (APA) of Oregon, an act outlining hearings procedures for state agencies. According to Hendricksen, the committee does not believe it is required to meet up with the APA.

ASUO Consultant Don Chalmers says that the committee's rules do not provide affirmative policy guidelines, with more specific wording.

"They need a set of regulations telling the institutions what their responsibilities are in eliminating discrimination. The committee's recommendations don't give a general idea of what kind of things are discriminatory."

The coalition is hoping that the board will reject the committee's proposed rules and consider their

suggestions instead.

The board will also review more than a year's worth of study and research proposing a revised budgeting model for the State System of Higher Education. The present system of allocation to the universities and colleges is based almost entirely on the amount of full-time equivalent (FTE) hours at each institution. The proposed system, labeled the Resource Allocation/Acquisition Model, focuses on programs offered by each institution as well as the FTE count.

The new formula would give money to schools on the basis of instruction, non-sponsored research, public services, libraries and museums, student services, operational and building costs and general institution support.

University Pres. William Boyd is opposed to the recommended model as it now reads. He believes there are major flaws in the model which work to the disadvantage of the University. He says that research universities such as the University of Oregon should be considered on a different basis than undergraduate colleges.

The ASUO is in favor of the plan, although they oppose including non-sponsored research as part of the consideration for funds.

## Intern posts open

A variety of tasks ranging from clerical work to research and writing awaits students interested in working with Oregon congressmen and senators as congressional interns in Washington, D.C. this spring and summer.

According to Tom Mackey, administrative assistant to Congressman Jim Weaver, the Lyndon Baines Johnson Congressional Internship Program provides \$500 a month for student interns. This fund, set up four years ago, applies to all congressmen. However, only three of Oregon's four congressmen, Bob Duncan, Al Ullman and Weaver, are sponsoring Oregon students under the program for spring and summer.

Mark Cogan, ASUO administrative assistant, said that Oregon senators offer internship programs to students as well.

"Competition for the positions is intense," Cogan said, "so it's more important for a timely application and a thorough explanation of why an individual is suited for the job."

Both Mackey and Cogan said a resume with a cover letter completes the application process. The resume should explain reasons for applying and experience. However, both men said that experience need not be political, and that work assigned would depend on an individual's interests and skills.

Interested students may be able to receive University credit while in the Capitol, Cogan said.

He stressed that the application deadlines for the internship programs are rapidly approaching. The deadline for Weaver's spring interns is Feb. 15 and Ullman's deadline is in March. Packwood's deadline is Feb. 29 for the summer session and some of Packwood's representatives will be interviewing on campus in March.
