

Business school overcrowded

Severe overcrowding in the business school has prompted a committee of three students to meet with University Pres. William Boyd today to acquaint him with the student viewpoint on the issue.

The committee, composed of representatives for graduates and undergraduates of the business school will meet with Boyd at 2 p.m. The meeting is in re-

sponse to a memorandum sent to Boyd in December by Richard West, dean of the business school.

According to West, the memo said that without additional resources the school couldn't meet student demands. It also outlines two alternatives: 1) either expand to meet student demand, or 2) stop growing.

"I was simply trying to get an

understanding with Pres. Boyd of the alternatives available to us," said West of his memo.

West stressed the business college is not demanding more resources. "We're not saying we have to have additional resources," he said. "We're simply saying that without them, it is virtually impossible to continue meeting students' demands."

"The college has experi-

enced extreme growth rates over the last year, causing high student-faculty ratios—high enough to close classes early at registration. Our ratio is 20 per cent higher than the University average."

He said this is what most struck the students. "Several students came to talk to me about the problem, and the result is they're going to see Pres. Boyd."

Industry request blocks FDA ban on red dye

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal judge Tuesday temporarily blocked the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) from banning Red No. 2, one of the nation's most widely used dyes in foods, drugs and cosmetics.

The FDA has said there is a possibility the dye may be a weak cancer-causing agent.

U.S. District Court Judge Aubrey Robinson Jr. issued a temporary restraining order until a Feb. 6 hearing on an industry request for a permanent injunction.

The action was brought by the Certified Color Manufacturers Association, a trade group in Washington- Warner Jenkinson Co. of St. Louis, a major Red No. 2 manufacturer; H. Kohnstamm and Co. of New York; and Monarch Nugrape Co. of Doraville, Ga.

The attorney representing the companies said court rules limit temporary restraining orders to 10 days with one 10-day extension, and that a ruling could be expected by Feb. 17.

Commissioner Alexander Schmidt said the most recent FDA study could not establish the safety of Red No. 2 and raised new questions about the possibility that it might be a weak cancer-causing agent.

At the same time, Schmidt said, there was "no evidence of a public health hazard from any currently available food or other product made with Red No. 2" and there would be no recall of products already on the market.

The dye is used in hundreds of items, including soft drinks, candy, ice cream, cake frostings, maraschino cherries, pill coatings, liquid cough medicines and cosmetics.
