The Mock Turtle's lament is a hungry person's theme song. Dragging and chilled after a long day battling the elements, a person can find great comfort with a bowl of steaming soup. Not only serving as an elixir against all evils, soup is economical. Leftovers? Throw 'em in some boiling water, add some herbs and veggies and voila! Soup!

Flash . . . It's 6 p.m. and five drooling friends walk in the door. Conversations begin, interrupted by persistent yet distant rumblings. Apathy no longer rules and the group dashes to the kitchen cupboards. What gastronomic treasures are revealed? A few lousy onions, a few stale pieces of bread, a can of Parmesan cheese . . . hopeless . . . but Sunset's Cook Book of Soups & Stews comes to the rescue . . . French Onion Soup.

French Onion Soup is a flatterer; to salads, to sandwiches, to full-course meals and to figures. If the garnishes of bread and cheese are omitted, French Onion Soup is a pleasant change from bouillon cubes for dieters.

French Onion Soup

- 6 large yellow onions, thinly sliced
 - 2 T. butter or margarine
 - 1 T. olive oil (vegetable oil)
 - 6 c. freshly made or canned beef broth (bouillon cubes)
 - 1/2 c. white or red wine (optional)
 - Salt & pepper to taste
 - 1. Use a heavy 3-or 4-quart covered pan.
 - 2. Saute (fry) onions in butter and oil until limp. (that's the onions . . .)
 - 3. Cover and let simmer slowly for 15 min.
 - 4. Pour in beef broth or bouillon and wine (if desired)
 - 5. Simmer for 30 min.
 - 6. Taste and add salt and pepper if needed.
- Makes 1 1/2 quarts or 6 servings.

Serving suggestion: Top each serving with a half-inch slice of French bread. Toasted bread works the best because it doesn't get mushy. To toast bread: slice and butter bread, place on cookie sheet and bake in a 325° oven for 20 min. Sprinkle each piece of toast with shredded Gruyere or Parmesan cheese.

The program centers around a moderator and two or three guests each week. The half-hour is taken up with discussion about upcoming or ongoing events, primarily around the campus, with some community activities. Previous shows have covered exhibits at the Art Museum, the play "49," music performances and "minor" sports such as swimming and gymnastics.

The show, entirely staffed and produced by students, is aired on Mondays at 6:30 p.m. on PL-3, the campus station and repeated on Tuesdays at 8:30 p.m. and Wednesdays at 7:30 a.m.

The idea for the show came from Garrett Smith, a graduate

student in Broadcasting, and the idea became a reality with a grant from the Division of Broadcast Services (DBS). Babbs said anyone with suggestions of interest for the show should contact DBS or himself up on the third floor of Villard Hall. He said that issues or politics will not be covered. "It's more of an entertainment and activities focus."

"There's never been anything on PL-3 that you could count on every week," said producer-director John Babbs. "Hopefully it will generate some response to make it possible to have two or three student-produced shows nightly." *

The program will consist of 15 songs written by different persons involved in the show, but not necessarily performed by the person who wrote it.

Musicians involved in the program are Jim Lowry, Steven Koski and Carol Kagy, from Sojac, and Denny Con, George Navarro, Kathy Smith, Kriss Smith, Janie Smith and Harvey Poznanski from Mithrandir.

Bobb Koski, Janis Gaines, Gil Dunaway, Jeff Stier and Susan Davis will also perform.
