Curb changes replace ramps

The administration has finally initiated some "concrete" changes on this campus. Harold Babcock, physical plant director, says that most of the new curb cuts are merely replacements for temporary blacktop ramps. He said, "I put those blacktop ramps in without authorization from the city. They (the blacktop ramps) back the water up and create quite a mess. The curb cuts are really the right way to do it." Babcock said the curb cuts and the original ramps were put in to make it easier for wheelchairs to be used on campus. He added that more curb cuts would be put in when there was more money.

Rally, march facts revised

During Monday's rally and march by members of the Revolutionary Student Brigade and the Committee to Fight for the

Right to an Education, the doors to Johnson Hall were open and were used by the marchers to gain admittance to the building.

The offices of the State System of Higher Education personnel were closed, however, in observance of Lincoln's birthday. Despite this, vice-chancellor William Lemman was present in the building and was confronted by members of the group and other supporters protesting tuition hikes.

Lemman responded to the group by saying he was not responsible for tuition in the state's higher education system.

Also, the front-page picture in Tuesday's *Emerald* depicting the rally in front of the EMU was taken at time when about 150 people were watching. About 50 of those people participated in the Johnson Hall march.

Demonstrators hearing reset

A pre-trial hearing scheduled Wednesday for the seven defendants accused of disrupting University Pres. William Boyd's inauguration was cancelled. The new judge assigned to hear the case was out of town. The Municipal Court will schedule another hearing date for sometime next week.

Enrollment up 5.3 per cent

Fourth week enrollment figures for winter term reached 16,470, a 5.3 per cent increase over last year, according to J. Spencer Carlson, University Registrar.

Carlson said the increase is largely due to the 619 non-matriculant and special students enrolled. He indicated, however, that these special students do not account for the total increase.

James R. Buch, Associate Director of Admissions said, "A greater number of people who are admitted are enrolling. There's less shopping around."

Previously enrolled students are re-enrolling at a higher rate which also helps to account for the increase this term, he said.
