Warner wants 1976 symbol on certificates

The national Bicentennial symbol would decorate 1976 graduation certificates if John Warner, administrator of the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration (ARBA), could have his way. Warner wants the class of '76 to have a special commemorative of the nation's Bicentennial.

"Graduates of 1976 should have more than vague memories of their final year in school," says Warner. "They should have a lasting memento of a year that saw



them embark on their new life, and a year that saw America embark on its third century."

Recently revised guidelines on the use of the national symbol allow schools to place it on diplomas. Warner also encourages schools to use the symbol in their yearbooks, along with articles on student participation in the Bicentennial.

The symbol is a five-pointed star surrounded by a red, white and blue second star. Under law, the ARBA is responsible for regulating the use of the national symbol, but it has said that specific authorization is not needed by a school as long as the symbol will not be used in conjunction with advertising.

Use of the national Bicentennial symbol must conform with the standards and guidelines of the ARBA Graphics Standards Manual. The manual can be obtained from the ARBA, 2401 E Street, N.W. Washington, D.C. 20276.

The Ruhl Symposium program allows the school to bring prominent professional journalists to the campus to lecture students, meet with faculty, and share viewpoints on the state of the press and its prospects.

The program was endowed by Mrs. Robert Ruhl in memory of her late husband, the long-time publisher of the *Medford Mail Tribune*.

Noise probs? Write...

Annoyed by excessive noise from motor vehicles? The Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) maintains a system for the public to report noisy motor vehicles.

The department advises that people reporting such excessive noise must have the license number, type and description of the vehicle and the time and location of the alleged infraction.

Complaints can be mailed or telephoned to the DEQ headquarters office, 1234 S.W. Morrison, Portland, 97205, 229-6085 or any of the DEQ regional offices throughout the state.

The department sends a notice of the reported violation to the registered owner of the vehicle, requesting the owner to correct the noise problem within 15 days.
