Money grants number more this fiscal year

The University received 30 per cent more in grants during the first half of the 1975-76 fiscal year than it got during the same period last year.

The College of Education received the greatest amount in grants. Its Center on Human De-

velopment was given \$360,017 in January.

The federal Office of Education gave the money to the center for research. The center works with handicapped and retarded children and adults.

Director Robert Schwarz says that the center is the recipient of many grants because of the importance of its programs.

Financial Administrator Don Howard prepared a report detailing grants the University has received so far this year. He warns that the figures are not entirely comparable because of the unpredictable times at which grant money is received.

Joanne Carlson, assistant dean at the Graduate School, is also cautious. "With the loss of such programs as the Tongue Point Job Corps Center, our total grant picture at the end of the fiscal year could look pretty bleak," she said.

Tongue Point provided vocational and general educational training for 16 to 21-year-old

women from low-income homes who had not completed high school. "We lost the contract because we were unable to reach a satisfactory agreement with the Department of Labor on funding," says Steve Goldschmidt. Goldschmidt is an assistant professor at the center for Educational Policy and Management.

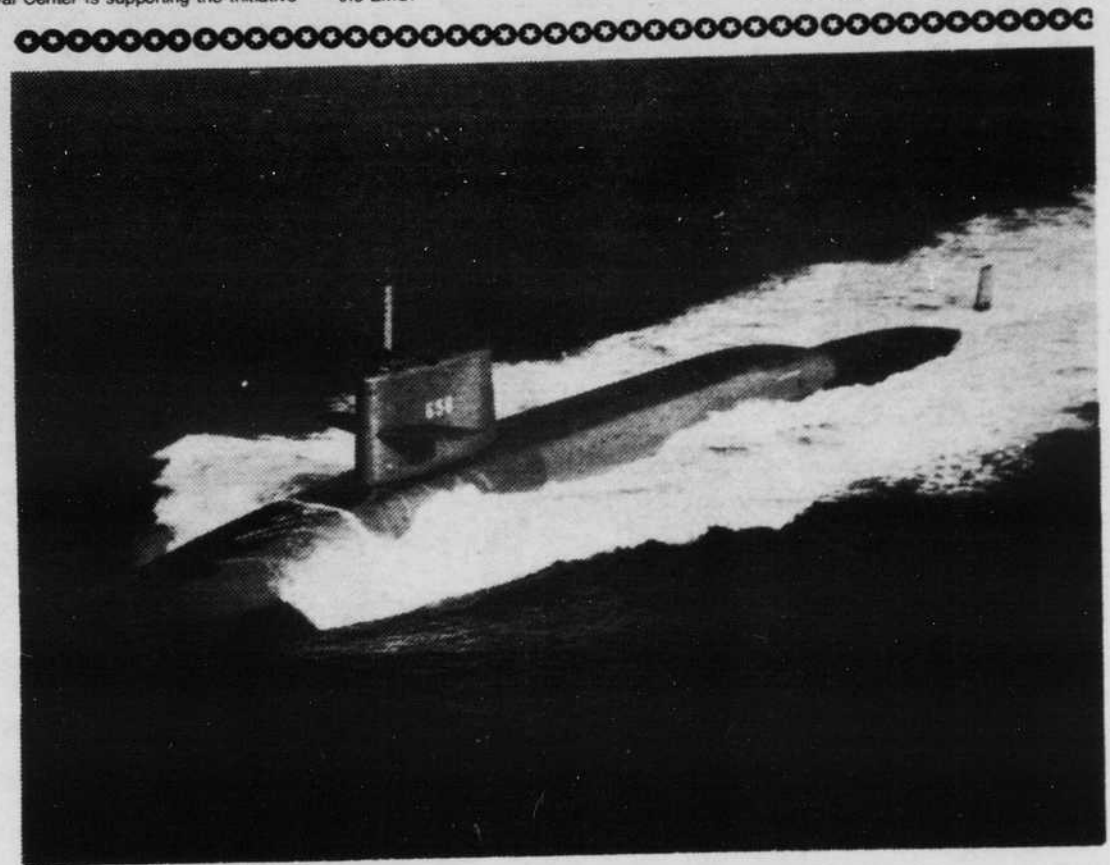
