

Jazz program set for tonight

The University's Faculty Club is sponsoring a free jazz concert to-night at 7:15 p.m. in the EMU Ballroom.

Selections of music by Bobby Troup, Henry Mancini and Thad Jones will be performed by the 180-piece Lane Community College Jazz Lab Band #2, conducted by Gene Akins.

The Dorians and Chantells, singing groups from South Eugene High School, will present

five or six selections of vocal jazz. All faculty, staff and students and their families are invited to attend.

Rotary grant deadline nears

March 1 is the deadline for applications for Rotary Foundation grants to study abroad.

Candidates must have their applications completed and turned into the Eugene Rotary Club office in the Eugene Hotel by that date. The applications are for the

1977-78 academic year. The Rotary Foundation will expend more than \$6 million in grants for 750 graduates and under-graduate students, technical trainees and teachers of handicapped programs.

Appeals court to meet here

University law students will be able to observe a state appellate court in action in one of their own classrooms, when the Oregon Court of Appeals holds its annual Eugene court session Friday.

Oral arguments in five cases will be held in the law school's courtroom facility, Room 221, starting at 9:30 a.m., according to Chief Judge Herbert M. Schwab.

Judges sitting in Eugene will be Schwab, William S. Fort and Robert Y. Thornton. Fort is a former Lane County circuit judge.

The six-member court normally hears cases in panels of three. The other members of the Court of Appeals are Judges Robert H. Foley, Virgil Langtry and Jason Lee.

Two of the cases to be heard Friday are based on inverse condemnation in which property owners allege they have been damaged by certain governmental actions.

The five cases include Vernon L. Egge (plaintiff-appellant) v. Lane County, William E. and Velita Willard (appellants) v. City of Eugene, State v. Robert Gaylor (appellant), the Berman Corp. (appellant) v. State Highway Commission, and William and Ruth Littlejohns, Pub East and Patricia Ann Wyckoff (petitioners) v. Oregon Liquor Control Commission.

Tense people can get help

Persons who frequently feel "uptight" or tense are eligible to take part in a free self-help treatment program for anxiety, sponsored by the University psychology clinic.

The three-week program involves learning relaxation skills on one's own, according to coordinator Cliff Lewis, doctoral student in counseling psychology.

Participants visit the clinic only once, for approximately an hour, to pick up the instructional materials. The self-administered treatment sessions require 15 minutes twice a day.

"This project is part of a larger one trying to assess how individuals do with this kind of program," explains Lewis.


