

Brussell: 'Oswald not a cruddy little communist'

Lee Harvey Oswald had close ties with the CIA and was later framed with the assassination of John Kennedy, says May Brussell, researcher into the assassination.

Brussell spoke to the University community at the law school Wednesday.

Brussell, who has spent thirteen years researching the JFK assassination and related events, told students that Oswald was not "the cruddy little Communist that the Warren Report presented him as."

Not only did Oswald have a security clearance by the Marines, he also had friends who were oil millionaires and doctor friends who were from the upper economic right wing, Brussell says. A fellow Marine

testified that Oswald had a high IQ, wrote well, and was well-trained in radar and electronics. This testimony, however, was ignored by the Warren Commission, according to Brussell.

Brussell says "the Warren Report left more unanswered questions than were answered." She points out several main inconsistencies which make the credibility of the report highly questionable.

Brussell cites the fact that the CIA was the only agency who investigated the JFK assassination, noting that the secretaries who took the minutes and the typists who did the actual typing of the report were CIA agents as well.

Over 100 witnesses that should have been called to testify were overlooked, Brussell says. She also claimed that if the witnesses seemed willing to talk, their testimony was to be held "off the record."

"Every piece of evidence was handled in a certain way in the Warren Report," she says. There was no

cross examination of witnesses, and contradiction in testimonies was ignored, Brussell says.

Calling Oswald's wife a "pathological liar," Brussell names Marina Oswald as the main factor leading to Oswald's conviction. Brussell believes that "without her, there never would have been a case against Lee Harvey Oswald." She holds that Mrs. Oswald was working with the CIA against Oswald and actually helped frame him by her testimony. Brussell called him a "patsy" for the killing of JFK.

The Oswalds had met only twice prior to their engagement and were never alone together. After they were married, Mrs. Oswald met alone separately with both the military and the CIA.

Brussell, who writes for Paul Krassner's *The Realist*, says that she lectures at college campuses in an effort to alert students to "the assassination conspiracy that has been taking place in this country since World War II."

Science museum houses polar bears, planetarium

Inside the venerable brick building on the corner of 5th and Wilamette Streets, Polar bears stalk, Gemini space modules prepare for take-off and "air chairs" hover quietly above the ground.

These are only a few of the many exhibits now showing at Southwest Oregon Museum of Science and Industry (OMSI) in Eugene.

According to the new director of OMSI, Flora Anderson, the role of the museum includes "bringing to the community an educational experience in the biological and physical sciences and in industry that is not being offered in the public school system or in any other educational institution."

"Our role also includes providing a unique learning experience through our museum tours and our planetarium shows, and providing a sales outlet for an unusual stock of scientific merchandise which cannot be purchased elsewhere," Anderson continues.

Since OMSI is completely independent, the museum relies totally on its retail sales, admission fees and community donations for its existence. The retail shop is the only store in Eugene which sells balance beam scales, and is one of two stores in Eugene which provides chemicals, but only to chemistry majors.

The planetarium is the only section of the museum which charges admission. The current planetarium show is called "2176 A.D., The Next 200 Years." The show revolves around space colonization, space shuttles and the search for life on other planets.

Other exhibits which tour guide Mikal Anderson finds exciting are a solar energy exhibit, a 300-year-old Klamath Indian canoe and a turn-of-the-century press which is still in use.

"We're very excited about where we're headed!" proclaims the director.

The new building will contain all new exhibits including a 40-foot planetarium, reports Anderson.

Birds head north again

The first signs of spring have flown across Eugene. The first of the returning migratory birds, two tree swallows, were sighted Jan. 31 near the north entrance of Finley National Wildlife Refuge by Bill Peterson, a Corvallis birdwatcher. The refuge is off Highway 99 about 25 miles north of Eugene.

Spring arrival times of migratory birds are generally consistent over the years. Variation is usually due to bad weather somewhere on the migration route up the Pacific Coast. Low pressure systems and instability can delay birds, sometimes by several weeks.

Tree swallows normally arrive about Feb. 17, according to records kept by the Eugene Natural History Society. If the pattern of early arrivals continues, the skies over Skinner Butte may be flocked with hummingbirds, vultures, sandhill cranes, and other migratory birds for the next few weeks.

Women have no problem with grounds crew job

Three University students are convincing people that women can be good at heavy jobs, too.

Jean Vignes, Cindy Turnbow and Claire Carder all hold part-time jobs with the University Physical Plant. Vignes, a sophomore, is the only woman member on the labor force. Turnbow and Carder, junior and senior respectively, work for the grounds crew.

Vignes commented she gets no special treatment from the men she works with. "The men don't baby her," agreed John Evans, foreman of the labor force. "I've got men bigger than her that are weaker than she is."

Some of Vignes' jobs have included driving a gravel truck, laying cement, moving furniture and operating a jackhammer. Using the jackhammer is one of her favorite duties, and the one that gets the most stares from casual observers. As one male student exclaimed, "I'd be afraid to do that myself!"

The chance to work outside is the biggest benefit of the job, according to Turnbow. She wanted the job badly enough to overcome rejection, finally getting it through sheer persistence.

"The work isn't that hard," Turnbow observed. "You could make it hard—it's all psychological." She did add, though, that being in shape is important.

Turnbow and her co-worker Claire Carder, who works on a separate crew across campus, do tasks such as raking leaves and pruning.

Turnbow said she gets her share of stares, too. "I get the funniest looks sometimes, especially when I drive the big truck out to the dump." She called this "silent pressure," and observed that some of the people on the grounds crew are against working with women. However, her group treats her as an equal, and she noted that they were not selected to work with her because of their attitude.
