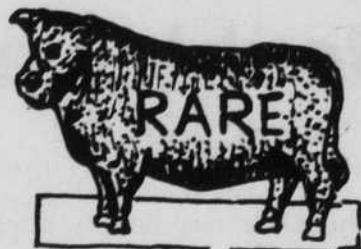

The University Physical Plant, which takes care of all maintenance problems on campus, is our official hole-filler-inner; however, they seem to have a rather vague definition of exactly what a hole is. Harold Babcock, Director of the Physical Plant, has informed the Beef Box that they "normally wouldn't fill in a hole unless it becomes a danger." The question here, of course, is: "What must a hole do to qualify as dangerous?" Foam at the mouth?

According to Babcock, the most effective means of getting holes in the street filled in is to file a complaint with the Physical Plant or Campus Security. "If there is a hazardous situation, and we can take care of it, we will certainly act upon it as soon as possible," he assured.

The large hole in front of Johnson Hall formerly used for 'a planting' was filled in several weeks ago, according to Babcock. That hole, incidentally, has an interesting history. About a year ago, someone chopped a hole in the middle of the street and stuck a sign in it as a protest of some sort. It remained unfilled, Babcock says, "because we figured if we filled it in they'd just dig it up again. This way, they had a ready-made protest hole." The University of Oregon Official Protest Hole (as designated by the Physical Plant) was finally filled in on Babcock's orders. "It looked real dangerous to me," he said.

Complaints on the state of any campus roads may be directed to the Physical Plant (x5243), Campus Security (x5444), or R.H. Sudmann, Director of Campus Safety (x3192). In addition, the committee handling the administration of parking funds will attempt to resolve any such problems. Federal grant opens student service jobs

University students soon will have a chance to help others — as well as themselves — thanks to a grant recently received from the federal ACTION program.

Some \$165,000 in all is expected to be given to the University to provide students with opportunities in various county and community agencies, according to Anita Runyan, assistant professor of community service and public affairs.

The program, dubbed the "University Bicentennial Year for Action," will provide as many as 50 students with year-long jobs in such agencies as Head Start, Runyan said.

"We're negotiating at this point," she said. "We're working with Lane County and with the elderly on nutrition and transportation programs."

The Community Service and Public Affairs (CSPA) department is also working with other areas to "see how this year-long experience would fit in with goals of other majors," Runyan said. The University Recreation and Park Management department has already expressed interest in the program.

Students in the program, 25 of which will start March 1, receive \$200 per month while working with the development projects. Participants will spend four days a week with the agency, the fifth day completing accompanying academic programs at the University.

"The University has never had anything like this," said Runyan, "although students in CSPA must complete a field program through the department." A similar grant has been awarded to Lewis and Clark College in Portland, she added.

Juniors, seniors and graduate students are eligible for the program, and will be grouped in teams of 3 to 5 at each agency, Runyan said. Seven agencies "hopefully" will sponsor projects, according to her.

Panelists will be Yitzhaki; lecturer John Rothman of Los Angeles; Reed Straus, visiting assistant professor, University Honors College; Moti Peri, Israeli graduate student at the University; and Avshalom Beni, Israeli graduate student at Portland State University.

A short film, "The History of Israel," will be shown during the teach-in.

Tuesday evening, John Roth-

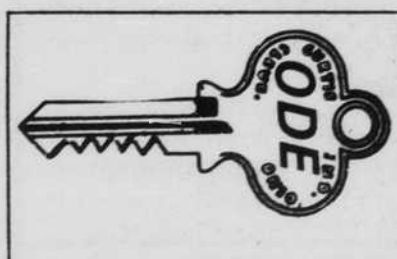
man will speak on the history of Israel and Zionism, at 7:30 in the EMU. The documentary, "Israel, A Profile," will be shown.

Israeli books, records, games and other items will be displayed at an Israel Fair and Exhibition all day Wednesday in Room 167 EMU.

Jacob Dweck of the Israel Aliyah Center in San Francisco, which sponsors living and study in Israel, will be present at the Aliyah Information Desk in the EMU on Wednesday from 11:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Dweck will discuss "Opportunities, Lifestyles and Programs in Israel" at 2 p.m., Wednesday, in the EMU, room to be posted.

Avshalom Beni, a member of an Israeli kibbutz for eight years, will talk about "The Kibbutz" at 7 p.m. Wednesday in the EMU, room to be posted.



Israeli folk dancing will be offered at 8 p.m. Wednesday also in the EMU.

Smuel Avital, visiting associate professor of mathematics, will lecture on "Education of the Disadvantaged in Israel" at 2 p.m. Thursday in the EMU. A documentary, "Israel, The Reality" will be shown following his talk.
