

Grads offered foreign study

The Council for European Studies (CES) will conduct a Pre-Dissertation Fellowships Program to enable graduate students to spend a summer or equivalent period in Europe prior to making final plans for their dissertations.

The program will give graduate students a chance to explore the feasibility of dissertation topics

and to sharpen needed research skills.

Applications are invited from all social sciences and related disciplines and are encouraged from those areas of study in which less attention has been given to Western Europe, such as anthropology, economics, social psychology, and sociology. The program places particular emphasis on the development of research projects dealing with contemporary Western European topics.

The deadline for receipt of application materials is March 20.

Applicants must submit a 750-1,000-word statement on proposed program, two faculty references and a language competence statement (where applicable) along with the CES forms. Inquiries should be sent to Glenda Rosenthal, CES, Institute on Western Europe, Columbia University, New York, N.Y. 10027. Announcement of awards will be made April 30.

The award may be used for transportation, living and research expenses. An average award is \$1,100.

Bishop Thomas Gumbleton, vice-president of Bread for the World, will speak at 8 p.m. Wednesday in 138 Gilbert.

Bread for the World is a Christian organization dedicated to the problem of world hunger. Bishop Gumbleton's topic will be "The Role of a U.S. Citizen in a Hungry World."

Bishop Gumbleton is an auxiliary bishop of Detroit, Mich. He serves along with Sen. Mark Hatfield on the board of Bread for the World. He is also a board member of Clergy and Laity Concerned.

Group to raise museum funds

A University faculty member has established a local committee to raise funds for a New York library and museum which specializes in black culture.

Edwin Coleman, assistant professor of English, calls the group the "Eugene Save The Schomburg Committee." The name is taken from the Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture, located in Harlem.

The existence of the center, Coleman explains, is currently being threatened by inadequate funding.

"It is probably the largest, most comprehensive collection of the art, history and literature of black people in the world," he says. "The center's collection contains works by virtually every major black author, both early and contemporary. Some of the works date back to the 16th century."

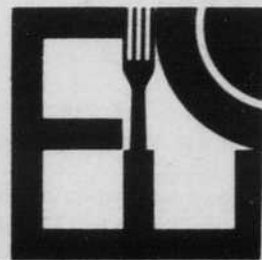
