

Geologist gives lecture tonight

Richard Bowen, formerly of the Oregon Department of Geology and Mineral Industries and now a consulting geologist, will speak tonight on "Geothermal Energy and the Quality of Life in Oregon," at 7:30 in 123 Science.

Bowen, a recognized expert on geothermal energy and its en-

vironmental impact, will speak on the effect an electrical generation facility would have and compare that to the impact of coal and nuclear-fired plants.

He will also discuss space heating, which uses hot geothermal water, and include his recent proposal to heat Timberline Lodge with geothermal waters.

The talk will include slides and will last about one hour. It is sponsored by the Condon Club and all interested persons may attend.

"Feedback" is a weekly OEPBS-TV series. It is broadcast on PL-3, Eugene, KOAP-TV, Portland and KOAC-TV, Corvallis.

Depression clinic to begin

The University Psychology Clinic's neuropsychology lab will soon begin a program for persons who are depressed.

A four to six week treatment program for depressed persons will get under way in March at the clinic. Fees are based on ability to pay, but will be waived if the client completes all assessment and daily records.

Clients will be selected on the basis of a screening test and interview with a staff member. Treatment sessions at the clinic will take place twice a week, at the client's convenience. Interested persons are asked to visit the neuropsychology lab section of the psychology clinic in Straub Hall. Entrance to the clinic is on 15th Avenue, just east of Onyx Street and across from the co-

vered tennis courts.

Screening takes approximately one and one-half hours and will be conducted at the initial visit, according to Sally Grosscup, doctoral student in counseling psychology and one of the coordinators of the research and treatment project.

Chamber choir slates concert

Tuesday's concert will be broadcast live over the campus radio station, KWAX-FM.

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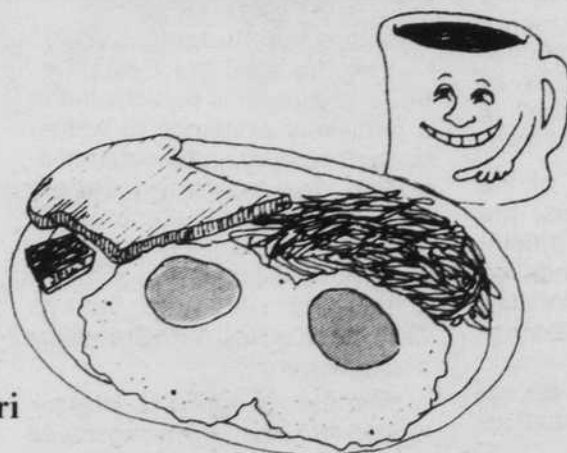
