

Course information book widens scope

Responding to student criticism, ASUO officials have broadened the contents of the Course Information Booklet by offering more specific details on University courses.

The booklet, compiled by the ASUO Executive, will be available within two weeks.

"Students complained that the booklet wasn't complete enough. We feel that this will be taken care of due to legislation," says Peter Spratt, ASUO administrative as-

sistant for academic affairs.

Recent faculty legislation requires teachers to release course information. Because of this, a near 100 per cent faculty response has occurred.

The manual's purpose is to give students a more active role in choosing and directing their education, according to Spratt. "The booklet provides students with the chance to make intelligent curriculum decisions...the catalog just isn't enough."

The ASUO official believes that the helpfulness of the publication

will increase with the inclusion of more specific information.

In addition to the general information provided in the past, assignment weights, required and optional readings and book lists and prices will be included.

The previous issue included course format and objectives, amount and types of exams, class size, prerequisites and the professor's office hours.

Some students expressed disappointment that course evaluation results will not be included in the spring issue.

"We feel it would be unfair to

those faculty members who did respond to print them, so we'll wait until the next issue. For the fall booklet, we'll go door-to-door to get results," adds Spratt.

Some faculty members oppose the inclusion of student evaluation material, according to Spratt.

"We made an attempt to get that information, but due to a communication problem, only 15 responses were returned," explains Spratt.

"The only thing we'll put in is statistical information. The faculty are afraid we will point the finger at specific instructors, although we tried to make it clear that this is not what we are doing," he says.

Funded by advertising and ASUO budget allotments, the course evaluation booklet will be available no later than the middle of finals week at Oregon Hall, ASUO offices and the EMU. Copies will also be placed in Mac Court during spring term registration.

"And it had national implications as well," Bernau claimed. "This is the first time students anywhere in the nation have sponsored anything like this on collective bargaining. For the first time the nation has been able to see how students look at this issue."

According to Bernau, both of the symposium will be further

extended by publication of a 33-page documentation of the symposium this spring. Cost of the booklet was covered under the collective bargaining expenses.

The ASUO president claimed students "are getting their money's worth" from the salary paid to Don Chalmers. Over the six-month period, the ASUO consultant was involved in research

on the history of McArthur Court, the EMU, the tennis courts, SB 2131, development of the ASUO News Bureau and setting up a grievance procedure for students following the AD ticket lottery hassle fall term.

Money spent by the IFC, the SUAB and the EMU Board totaled \$19,797.92, \$1,233.55 and \$0 respectively. These funds were spent from budgets of \$26,613.46, \$10,348.02 and \$322.
