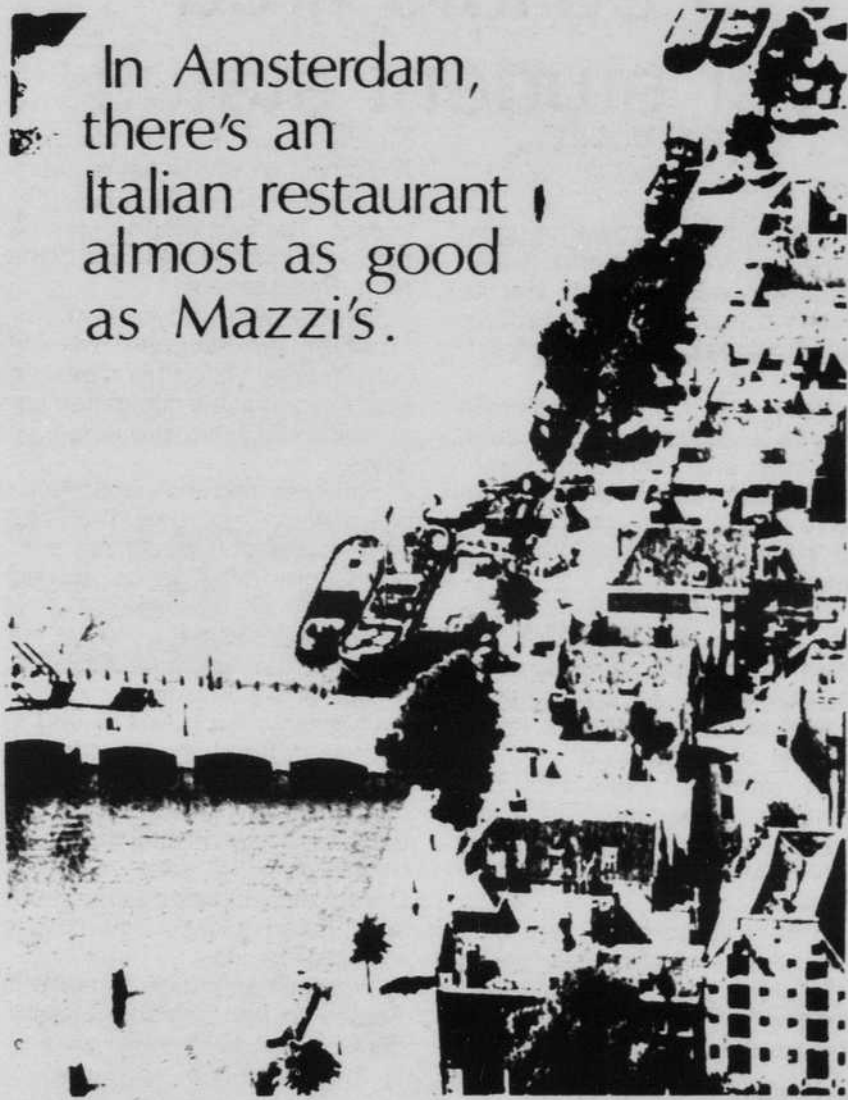

The ASUO will hold public hearings on the EMU tavern proposal and issues concerning dormitory students today in the EMU.

Hearings on the tavern proposal will be from 12:30 to 2 p.m. in the EMU Forum. Issues to be discussed will include the tavern's funding, beverage offerings and operation hours.

Another tavern hearing will be held Tuesday from 2 to 4 p.m. also in the EMU Forum.

Issues concerning dormitory students will be discussed at a hearing tonight at 7:30 in the EMU (room to be posted). Items to be discussed include the ASUO law-

suit, telephone service, alcohol in the dorms, co-ed dormitories, room and board rate increases and rules and regulations.

These are the first in a series of public hearings on issues of importance to students, according to the ASUO.

"The ASUO is interested in making sure students are involved in the University policy decisions affecting them," said Mark Cogan, ASUO administrative assistant. "Through hearings such as this, we will be able to gauge student views as to how the decisions will be more responsive to their needs."

Poet to present works

Pulitzer prize-winning poet W. S. Merwin will read some of his poems and short prose pieces tonight at 8 p.m. in 150 Geology.

Merwin was born in New York City in 1927 and grew up in Union City, N.J. and Scranton, Penn. He has lived in the United States and abroad as a tutor and translator. He has also lived and traveled in France, England, Portugal, Majorca and Mexico.

His articles have appeared in

The Nation and *The New York Review of Books*.

Merwin has been called "the most spiritual of contemporary American poets." His collection of poetry, "The Carrier of Ladders," won him the Pulitzer prize in 1972.

His other books of poems include "The Lice," "The Moving Target," "The Drunk in the Furnace," "Writings to an Unfinished Accompaniment" and "The Dancing Bears."

Homer work on display

The first West Coast showing of Winslow Homer's work in black and white will be featured at the University Museum of Art today through April 11.

The exhibition includes 60 works in graphics and watercolor from the extensive permanent collection of Homer's art at Bowdoin

College Museum of Art, Brunswick, Maine.

"The importance of black and white in Winslow Homer's career can hardly be overstressed," says Philip Beam, curator of the Homer Collection at Bowdoin. Homer is recognized as one of America's leading artists.
