

Orientation jobs available

The orientation office is hiring currently enrolled undergraduate students to assist with orientation programs. The programs are listed below and the assignments are varied:

•Telephone Project — During April and May for approximately four weeks (from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m.). Student aides call admitted-for-fall-1976 freshmen to acquaint them with the early orientation and registration program in July and to answer the questions of entering students and parents. Each aide will work approximately 15 hours on this project.

•Early Orientation and Registration Program — July 19, 23, 24, 30 and 31. Student aides will serve as the University's official hosts, receiving guests to campus, facilitating their participation in a day of scheduled events and responding to questions, concerns and specific interests of new students and their parents. Approximately 75 hours will be involved with this project.

•Foreign Student Orientation — Sept. 16-19. Students will assist in an orientation program for new foreign students. The duties are similar to those listed above under the Early Orientation and Registration Program. Each aide will work approximately 40 hours.

•New Student Week — Sept. 20-24. For five days during the

week of fall registration, aides will staff an information booth, conduct tours and assist in orientation programs as needed. Each aide will work approximately 40 hours.

The hourly wage is \$2.50. Students will be paid for work during each program as well as training prior to the programs and evaluation at their conclusion. Deadline for applications is April 5.

Tanzer to talk at Law School

Jacob Tanzer will speak at the Law School Wednesday at 3:30 p.m. in Room 129.

Tanzer is again running for the Court of Appeals and will discuss his candidacy.

Tanzer graduated from the Uni-

versity law school in 1959. He had a position with the U.S. Department of Justice during the Kennedy administration and he formed the appellate division of the state attorney general's office in 1969. He was appointed to the Court of Appeals in October 1973 by then Gov. Tom McCall. When he ran for the office in 1974, he was narrowly defeated.

City postpones trial of seven

The Eugene city prosecutor's office has postponed the trial of the seven persons charged with disorderly conduct at University Pres. William Boyd's Jan. 17 inauguration.

A new date has not yet been set for the trial, originally scheduled for Friday, but the prosecutor's office expects it to be as late as April.

Ten persons were arrested at the inauguration, and the seven accused of disorderly conduct are co-defendants in one trial. The city attorney who is chief prosecutor in the case was not available for comment on the reasons for postponement.

Social workers to hold meeting

The Social Workers Interest Group (SWG) will hold a meeting tonight at 6 to discuss the topic of graduate school versus work experience.

The meeting, to be held in the basement of Hendricks Hall, will

offer the viewpoints of three master degree graduates in social work — Tom Moen, from children's services division; Mary Ann Holser, mental health; and Jay Rudman, Sacred Heart Hospital.

The speakers will present perspectives on graduate schools, the advantages and disadvantages, as well as recommending particular colleges.

The meeting will begin with a potluck dinner. Persons interested in social work or related disciplines are invited.

Power debate slated tonight

A debate on nuclear power scheduled for 7:30 tonight in 167 EMU will feature two Westinghouse employees, a University chemistry professor and an anti-nuclear power activist from Portland.

The program is part of a series of debates arranged in various Oregon cities by the Westinghouse Corp. Sandra Keifer and Dave Ferg will represent Westinghouse in the debate.

Ray Wolfe, a chemistry professor at the University and chair of the Eugene Future Power Committee, will be joined by Bill Boley, a high school teacher from Portland and managing editor of the *Oregon Times* magazine on the "con" side of the nuclear power question.

The program is sponsored by the EMU Cultural Forum and is free of charge.
