The exhibition will be open from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. both days. There is no cost for the event. Some works will be available for purchase.

Clinic to aid newlyweds

Another workshop for newlyweds will be offered by the psychology clinic this spring. The eight-week session, called Project Partners, is designed for couples married since March 1, 1975.

The focus will be on learning communications skills and how to plan enjoyable activities together, as well as skills to help couples reach accord on items of disagreement.

Couples will take part in small group activities. The research/treatment project will emphasize a behavioral approach.

Registration will be accepted until March 26. Information is available from the psychology clinic, 686-4954.

Cost is \$10 per couple, plus a \$35 refundable deposit.

The workshop, first offered in January, is sponsored by the Marital Studies Program at the clinic.

Paris program offered

The State University College at New Paltz in New York will offer academic study abroad for qualified undergraduates in philosophy and related subjects at the University of Paris during the 1976-77 academic year.

The typical program consists of four courses, including one in French, and a student can earn 32 semester hours of credit the full year. The hours are fully transferable to the student's own university or college.

The program begins with a five to six week intensive language and orientation session, followed by a regular French language course. The program begins approximately Sept. 15.

The "briefs" section is for campus and community announcements. No brief will be published that charges an admission or donation fee. However, classes that charge tuition or dinner events that offer a free program even to those who do not buy a dinner will be accepted.

All briefs must be typed, triple-spaced in a 65-unit

margin. Handwritten briefs will be given low priority. Briefs will be published one time only in any seven-day period, as space permits.

The Lane County Labor Council is holding a free public discussion concerning unemployment, work and the American economy, tonight at 7:30 in Harris Hall, 8th and Oak.

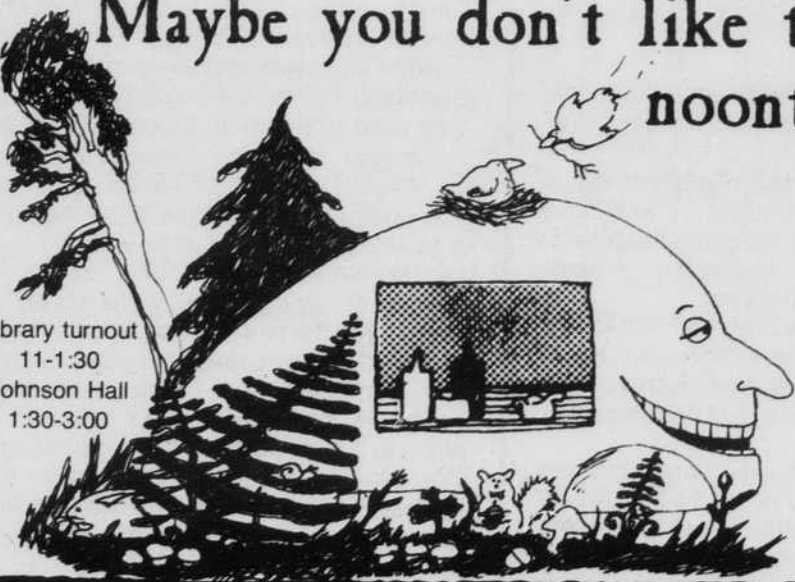
