

Group urges aid to stop

Following last week's arrest of more than 28 political and religious leaders in South Korea, the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC) is urging the United States government to immediately halt all aid to South Korea because of its human rights violations.

The 28 were arrested after they publicly demanded President

Park's resignation, an end to the Emergency Decrees suspending Constitutional freedoms, restoration of democratic freedoms, and the release of political prisoners.

Their statement was read publicly by Lee Oo Ching, President of Church Women United of Korea, at a Roman Catholic Mass on March 1st in the Catholic Cathedral in Seoul.

The Portland AFSC is urging American commercial interests to give careful consideration before doing business with the Park Government. Ann Zorn, Chair of

AFSC's Korea Committee, said, "In South Korea, the major impact of foreign investment and trade is to prop up the repressive Park government. This helps neither most Koreans, nor most Americans."

The AFSC is urging Portland area commercial and civic organizations, such as the Port of Portland and the World Affairs Council, to drop plans for events promoting increased American involvement in South Korea.
