

Patty's eastern trip interrupted by arrest

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Patricia Hearst had split with Sym-bionese Liberation Army "soldiers" William and Emily Harris and planned to flee to the East Coast in the weeks before her arrest, according to *Rolling Stone* magazine.

In a copyright article, the magazine reports that Hearst, convicted a week ago of bank robbery, was preparing to leave San Francisco with Steven Soliah, traveling first to Oregon and then to Boston, where they planned to work as community organizers.

The journey, according to authors David Weir and Howard Kohn, was to have begun by Oct. 1, 1975. Hearst, the Harrises and

Soliah were arrested here Sept. 18.

The article is contained in an issue of the magazine originally scheduled for release Thursday. However, the editors said they intended to withhold publication of the article until the jury in Soliah's bank robbery trial in Sacramento is sequestered.

Soliah, 27, is accused of an April 21, 1975, holdup at a Crocker National Bank branch in a Sacramento suburb. Jury selection resumes Tuesday.

A portion of the *Rolling Stone* article was made available to the Associated Press in advance of publication by the magazine's editors. The authors did not dis-

close their sources.

In the article, Weir and Kohn describe details of the so-called "missing year" in Hearst's account of her 19 months in the radical underground. Members of her jury cited her refusal to testify about the months from September 1974 to the time of her arrest as a factor in rejecting her story of constant fear and coercion by the remnants of the terrorist SLA.

Hearst began feuding with the Harrises shortly after their return from hideouts on the East Coast in the fall of 1974, the magazine says. They had taken up residence in an \$80-a-month apartment in Sacramento and Hearst was chafing under strict regimentation imposed by Harris, referring to him frequently as "Adolf," according to *Rolling Stone*.

The underlying dispute, according to *Rolling Stone*, was over Harris' role in the death of SLA "soldier" William Wolfe — one of six SLA members slain in a fiery shootout in Los Angeles a month

after the bank robbery here for which Hearst was convicted.

Hearst testified at her trial that Wolfe had raped her in the first weeks after her Feb. 4, 1974 kidnapping and that she despised him. The prosecution, however, contended that the 22-year-old defendant was in love with Wolfe, a point emphasized in the *Rolling Stone* account.

Hearst was encouraged in her dispute with the Harrises by Wendy Yoshimura, the fugitive artist arrested with her, *Rolling Stone* reports. At one point, she seriously considered contacting her parents but abandoned the idea for fear of prosecution on the bank robbery charges, according to the account.

Shortly after Hearst's arrest, *Rolling Stone* printed what it described as the "inside story" of the heiress' travels after the San Francisco robbery. Many of the details were confirmed later by Hearst's own testimony at her trial.

ASUO slates spring voting

The ASUO spring elections are underway once again with 24 student government positions up for grabs. Filing for the offices will remain open through Wednesday, April 7 in Suite 4 EMU.

Positions open include ASUO president, one Incidental Fee Committee slot, sophomore, junior and senior class officers (president, vice-president and secretary-treasurer), and 13 Student University Affairs Board (SUAB) slots.

Individual constituencies up for grabs on the SUAB are: law, CSPA (No. 1); business administration (No. 3); education, library science (No. 5 and No. 6); biology, pre-med (No. 8); science, math (No. 9); architecture, allied arts (No. 10); psychology (No. 12); liberal arts (No. 14); health, p.e., and recreation (No. 7); and language, arts and letters (No. 18).

Court OK's anti-gay laws

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court ruled Monday that no constitutional right is violated when a state makes it a crime for consenting adults to have homosexual relations in private.

Thirty-six states have such laws.

The court affirmed, without hearing arguments or issuing an explanatory opinion, an Oct. 24 decision of a three-judge federal court upholding the Virginia law.

Justices William Brennan Jr., Thurgood Marshall and John Paul Stevens voted against deciding the case without a hearing.

Virginia law makes sodomy a felony punishable by up to five years imprisonment and a \$1,000 fine.

Two anonymous homosexuals who had not been convicted challenged the act on grounds it violated the rights of homosexuals to "seek and enjoy sexual gratification."

All states made homosexuals acts a crime until 1961, when Illinois legalized such conduct between consenting adults in private.

Since then similar repeal measures have been passed in Connecticut, Colorado, Oregon,

Hawaii, Delaware, Ohio, North Dakota, South Dakota, Washington, California, New Mexico, Maine and Arkansas.

The laws remain in force in the District of Columbia and on federal reservations. Repeal legislation is pending in Congress and in several state legislatures.

Land sellers oppose repeal

SEASIDE (AP) — The Association of Oregon Realtors voted Saturday against seeking repeal of SB100, Oregon's land use law.

The realtors voted to oppose an initiative seeking to ban corporate farming in Oregon.

About 400 realtors met at the three-day convention and agreed to review SB100 if the repeal initiative gets on the ballot this year.

John Munro, legislative director of the association, said the group isn't opposed to the idea behind SB100, but feels interpretation has been too broad, resulting in a loss of local control over land-use decisions.

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
