

## Class explores 'natural' health

A class in women's healing tools, dealing with various methods of natural health maintenance, will be offered through the adult education program at Lane Community College spring term.

Aimed at women, the class will include such topics as body rhythms and natural balance through an understanding of anatomy, diet, herbs, massage

and yoga. Women's ailments, natural childbirth and birth control will also be discussed in the course.

Barbara Ride will teach the 10-week course held from 7 to 10 p.m. on Monday nights. Cost is \$15.
