

Child center sets program

A free treatment program will begin in mid-April at the University's Child Study Center for parents of children with behavioral problems.

The 10-week program will use educational training to help parents change their children's attitudes and behavior. Weekly ses-

sions, arranged at parents' convenience, will be held with the educational trainers.

"We currently are seeking children between the ages of 4 and 10 who display active behavior problems in the family setting," explains Suzanne Gaughen, research associate. The program is directed by Stephen Johnson, associate professor of psychology.

"By active behavior problems we mean children considered

hyperactive, aggressive, or a conduct problem," says Gaughen. "Such problems would include destructiveness, non-compliance, negativism, temper tantrums, disobedience, fighting, or excessive demands for attention."

Parents will be taught to observe carefully their child's behavior and to react more effectively to the child.

In addition to sessions with parents, the staff will visit participants' homes to spend time with the children.

Series views Oriental art
