## Morse chair favored

The Senate Labor and Public Welfare Committee has approved a proposal to provide federal matching funds for the creation of the Wayne Morse Chair of Law and Politics to the University.

Sen. Mark Hatfield said that up to \$500,000 will be provided on a two-thirds matching grant basis.

Therefore, the government will be authorized to provide \$2 for every \$1 raised privately by the University.

Hatfield said the proposal was included as an amendment to the Higher Education Act amendments approved by the Senate panel Monday.

"As a member of that committee, Wayne Morse fought hard for education and it is appropriate that the Higher Education Act be the vehicle to adopt this proposal," Hatfield said.

Morse was a member of the Senate Labor and Public Welfare Committee from 1945 to 1968.

Hatfield said the proposal still must receive approval by the full Senate and concurrence by the House of Representatives, which had not included such a provision in its version of the education bill. If the provision is retained in the final version of the bill, he said the actual funding would be provided at a later date in an appropriations bill.

# Escapee derides life in China

Speaking on life inside Mainland China Tuesday night, Tsou Kuang-Han, a former civil engineer who escaped from China in 1972 called his life there "intolerable." He said Mao Tse-Tung created a "funless" society where evenings are spent in meetings and Saturdays are taken by "voluntary" service work.

Tsou claimed that Mao's Communist Party controls, "the minds, the stomachs, and the feet of the people."

No foreign news is allowed, Tsou said. "I doubt that most people have even heard of the Apollo landing on the moon unless they listened to the Voice of America as I did."

The only major newspapers available in China, according to Tsou, are the *People's Daily*, *People's Liberation Army Daily* and *Red Flag*. All of them have roughly identical content, Tsou said.

One of the major complaints Tsou had was the ration coupon system in China. He called the system "a means of controlling the people." All commodities, such as clothing and manufactured goods, are rationed by coupons which Tsou said were exchanged for work points.

He said many people didn't have enough food and clothing. "Items such as radios, wrist watches and bicycles are considered luxuries," Tsou said.

He added that he considered the pictures of Nixon

in Peking surrounded by little girls with transistor radios a "big show."

Women in Communist China, Tsou said, are highly restricted in what they may wear. Lipstick, rouge, earrings and perfume are considered bourgeois and no high-heels or skirts are worn.

Tsou explained that everyone in China is categorized as belonging to either the "5-Black" or the "5-Red" classes of people. These categories pertain to the person's economic and political position before the revolution of 1949 and to the children and grandchildren of those people.

According to Tsou, the "5-Black" category consists of the families of landlords, rich peasants, counter-revolutionaries, bad elements and rightists. The "5-Red" class consists of members of the army, party cadres, workers, poor and lower peasants, and revolutionary martyrs.

Tsou said the people in the "5-Black" group "don't go to certain schools and seldom are allowed to go past junior high or get promotions. The "5-Red" category constitutes a privileged class," he said.

Tsou escaped from the country while assigned to a rural area in Yunnan. "My wife and I walked for 16 days through virgin forest across the border into Burma." He was forced to leave his two children behind since they weren't with him in the assigned area.
