

Info retrieval demo at Library

A new system that makes gathering bibliography materials for academic papers virtually instantaneous will be demonstrated this week by the University Library. Demonstrated will be the new on-line computerized information retrieval system.

The system is part of a national service, subscribed to by the University. The service stores thousands of book and article titles in a computer bank in Palo Alto, Calif. The University's library has access to that computer bank via teletype terminals.

How the system works will be demonstrated daily, Monday through Friday, from 10 to 11:30 a.m. in the science library and

from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. in the general library.

Shown will be typical computer searches for information in the fields of science, education and psychology.

Following the demonstrations, on-line searches will be made available to students and faculty on a reduced fee basis. Costs for computer information searches can range from \$5 to \$30.

Daly receives Ernst award

Owen Daly, a University doctoral student from Boise, Idaho, has received the University's 1975-76 Rudolf Ernst Graduate Fellow Award.

The \$500 award will help Daly complete his doctoral dissertation in the field of English. His disserta-

tion title is "This World and the Next: Religious and Secular Values in the Narratives of the Thornton Manuscript."

The 1975-76 award winner earned his M.A. degree in English from the University in 1972. He has been a graduate teaching fellow in the department since that time.

Given annually since 1967-68, the Rudolf Ernst Graduate Fellow Award was established by Alice Henson Ernst, University professor emeritus of English, in memory of her late husband, University Prof. Rudolf Ernst. Ernst was a faculty member at the University from 1923 until his death in 1963.
