

Hearst's willing testimony may help lighten sentence

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Patricia Hearst, facing a maximum penalty today of 25 years in prison for armed bank robbery, is willing to testify about the criminal activities of her one-time fugitive associates in order to lighten her sentence, sources said.

Hearst's attorneys declined Sunday to comment on her future as a prosecution witness but said they will stress her poor emotional and physical health in seeking her immediate release on probation.

The 22-year-old heiress "is emotionally and physically drained," said attorney Al Johnson, indicating that her mental state has deteriorated since her conviction on March 20 of willingly helping the Symbionese Liberation Army rob a Hibernia bank.

He said Hearst's main concern now is that she might receive a long prison sentence.

He said he and partner F. Lee Bailey will stress that Hearst was originally a kidnap victim of the ter-

rorist SLA in asking Carter for a light sentence.

Hearst has served seven months at the San Mateo County Jail since her arrest Sept. 18. That time would be used as a credit to reduce the length of time she must serve if Carter orders her to prison today.

Meanwhile, sources said Hearst is resentful of terrorists she believes are responsible for her predicament. They said she has given authorities some information and has offered to tell all she knows about bombings, murders and members of the radical underground network who protected her during more than a year and a half as a fugitive.

It was unlikely that Hearst's promise to act as a prosecution witness would be mentioned in open court Monday, but attorneys could tell the judge about the offer privately, the sources said. The information could also be given to probation officers who are making recommendations on sentencing.

Colegio Cesar Chavez

A bicultural approach

Colegio Cesar Chavez is the only Chicano college in the Northwest and the only independent Chicano college in the nation.

Located at the former Mt. Angel College campus outside of Salem, the bilingual and bicultural focus of the Colegio means more than the ability to converse in two languages. Biculturalism, the Colegio catalog says, means the ability to function within two different cultural and cognitive frameworks.

With this goal in mind, students are encouraged to get involved in community work and integrate theory and practice. Through the "College Without Walls" program students work in local school districts, Chicano organizations and state institutions.

This year, 75 full-time and 120 part-time students are enrolled in the Colegio, says Jose Romero, director of academic affairs. The five full-time instructors are assisted by several "adjunct" faculty members who work with the students in class and on their community projects.

Students plan their own programs in consultation with faculty committees. If the student is working toward a B.A. degree from the Colegio, he or she must acquire a mastery of both English and Spanish, an understanding of cultural relativism and an in-depth knowledge of a field, such as education, political science or business administration.

Anyone interested in the Colegio's program can apply. The \$500 per quarter tuition cost is midway between state and private colleges, says Romero. Financial aid programs are available to high-need students.

The former Mt. Angel College became Colegio Cesar Chavez Dec. 12, 1973, the religious feast day of Our Lady of Guadalupe, the patron saint of the Americas. For the next two years the fledgling college battled for its existence.

First there was the matter of an overdue federal loan that dated from the Mt. Angel College days. In May 1975 the federal Housing and Urban Development Office (HUD) threatened to foreclose the campus for non-payment of the loan.

This action drew protest from Colegio supporters who demonstrated at HUD offices in Seattle, Portland and Washington, D.C.

In July, 1975 HUD put the campus up for sale at a public auction. The U.S. government was the only buyer and paid \$1,054,510 (the



amount of the loan plus legal costs) for the property.

The Colegio, however, was not evicted. According to Romero, HUD officials didn't want to look like villains.

Since July, HUD and Colegio representatives have met several times to discuss the possibility of the Colegio leasing or renting the property from the government.

"We have had some good meetings," Romero said. "We feel confident that something will be worked out."

The second major battle the Colegio faced concerned the complex matter of accreditation and federal scholarship assistance. Students must be enrolled in an accredited college to be eligible for federal loans, scholarships and work-study.

June 18, 1975, the Colegio was granted status as a candidate for accreditation by the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges. This preliminary accreditation freed \$160,000 in federal Health, Education and Welfare money to be used by Colegio students.

It was the association's view that the Colegio has the resources and potential for progressing toward full accreditation. Romero says the Colegio hopes to achieve this status within two years.

In addition to its role as a college, the Colegio also functions as a focus for other educational and cultural activities. It operates an Adult Basic Education program, a GED component, a child-care center and a migrant summer school. It has also hosted numerous conferences relating to Chicano issues.
