

## Berrigan talks today in EMU

Daniel Berrigan, arrested earlier this year for digging up the White House lawn in protest of nuclear arms, will speak at noon today in the EMU Ballroom.

Berrigan became a celebrated anti-war activist in 1968 when he and eight others destroyed selective service records in Maryland. The trial of the participants, known as the "Catonsville nine," was the

basis for Berrigan's play, "The Trial of the Catonsville Nine."

The 55-year-old Jesuit priest and his brother Philip were nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize.

Berrigan's talk is sponsored by the EMU Cultural Forum. No admission will be charged.

## Panel includes former teacher

The second week of the EMU Cultural Forum's "Livability for

Oregon's Future" series starts today with the theme "Where Will You Be When the Lights Go Out? Energy in Oregon."

John Froines, a former University chemistry professor and Chicago Seven defendant, will be featured on a panel on "The Politics of Energy." Froines is currently director of Occupational Health in Vermont.

Other panel members will be Leslie Cox of the Eugene Future Power Committee, and Richard Sandvik, chief counsel for the Consumer Protection Division of

the Oregon Department of Justice. John Reynolds, University architecture professor and Eugene Water and Electric Board member, will moderate.

The panel is scheduled for 8 p.m. in room 167 EMU.

## Chinese auction procures funds

The Oregon State Employee's Association (OSEA) is sponsoring a "Chinese auction" Thursday to

### LECTURES

Michael Parkin, professor of economics at the

University of Western Ontario, will present a lecture today in 189 PLC at 3:30 p.m. His lecture will be related to monetary and inflation theory.

Professor Parkin is a well-known monetary economist and an expert on the economics of inflation. He has published widely in the major journals. His most recent contribution is a co-authored major

survey of inflation theory in the *Economic Journal*, December 1975.

"Exploration of the Inner Solar System: The Search for Our Origins" is the title of a speech by Robert Strom of the Department of Planetary Sciences and Lunar and Planetary Laboratory, University of Arizona, Tucson, Wednesday, 8 p.m., Room 150 Geology. The talk is sponsored by the Centennial Assembly and University Lectures Committee and the Department of Geology.

Dr. Strom has been a prominent member of NASA Scientific Teams since before Apollo, and most recently led the geological interpretation of the Mariner 10 photographic record of Mercury, Venus, Earth, Moon, and Mars.

On Thursday at 12:30 p.m., Dr. Strom will give a technical seminar on the surface features of Mercury and Mars, in the EMU (room number to be posted in the lobby), which is open to anyone interested.

The president of the Eugene Human Rights Commission on the Handicapped will talk on "Legislation, Past and Future," as part of the Handicapped Awareness Week program held today in the EMU.

Chris Casady, recently elected president of the Commission, will discuss state legislations which affect the physically handicapped. His talk is scheduled for 1 p.m. in the EMU. Location will be posted.

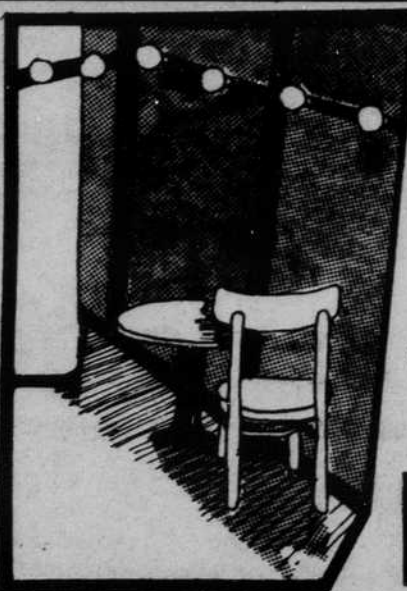
