

OSPIRG seeks summer interns

The Oregon Student Public Interest Research Group (OSPIRG) is seeking qualified applicants for summer research internships. Students either presently en-

rolled or who will be enrolled fall term in Oregon colleges and universities are eligible for the internship program. Interns will work under the di-

rection of OSPIRG's professional staff and earn \$1,200 for full time summer work. Students selected for internships are encouraged to arrange college credit for their research.

According to Jennifer Wyman, OSPIRG staff advisor to the intern program, research positions are open in the areas of forestry practices, water quality, coastal land use, agri-business, problems of migrant workers, and health care costs.

Persons who want to do research in areas not already designated for summer internships are encouraged to submit proposals and project outlines with their applications.

Applicants for all positions are required to submit a writing sample and should have experience in environmental or public interest research, law, or journalism.

The deadline for applications is April 21. The internships will be announced by May 3. Contact OSPIRG for more information.

A panel discussion on the social stigmas and psychological implications by several ALERT representatives begins at 3 p.m.

The Handicapped Awareness Week is sponsored by ALERT and the Oregon Architectural Barriers Council. An information booth is set up in the EMU lobby to educate the public on services and needs, and the availability of equipment for the disabled. The booth is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. during the week.

Energy panel talks on future

Various perspectives on Oregon's energy needs for the next 20 years will be discussed on a panel today as part of the EMU Cultural Forum's "Livability for Oregon's Future" series.

Panelists will include John Tiffany, a local businessman and Eugene Water and Electric Board member; Skip Stoppiello, a Portland architect; Forrest Blood, a planner with the Bonneville Power Administration, and Joel Schatz, former director of Governor McCall's Office of Energy Planning and currently director of Energistics, an energy research firm.

The discussion, titled "Energy for Oregon's Future," will take place in the EMU Forum room at 12:30 p.m.
