Speech, fair explore 'livability'

Those who missed John Froines' Wednesday talk can hear him today at 12:30 in the EMU Forum room.

Froines, a former University professor and Chicago Seven defendant, will speak on "Occupational Safety as an Environmental Issue." Froines is currently Director of Occupational Health in Vermont.

In addition an Energy Fair is scheduled on the EMU Terrace today from noon to 2 p.m. The fair will feature exhibits and information on energy efficient devices such as a solar water heater, a composting toilet and a bicycle-powered kitchen blender.

Both Froines' speech and the Energy Fair are presented as part of the EMU Cultural Forum's "Livability for Oregon's Future" series.

Prof publishes X-ray volumes

University physics professor Bernd Crasemann has recently published two volumes entitled "Atomic Inner-shell Processes."

"In these two volumes Crasemann and the numerous contributing authors have aimed to expound key areas of the recent X-ray revival," says reviewer Richard Deslattes of the Optical Physics Division of the National Bureau of Standards in Washington, D.C.

Deslattes notes that new applications in condensed-matter physics, ion-atom collisions, astrophysics, and plasmas have re-exposed some of the unsolved problems in the X-ray field and have offered new tools for their treatment.

He recommends the volumes to "anyone wanting to know where the X-ray business has gone."

On Sabbatical leave, Crasemann presently holds a \$37,500 NASA grant to research on multiply-ionized atoms at Ames Research Center in Moffett Field, California. He has been on the University faculty since 1953.

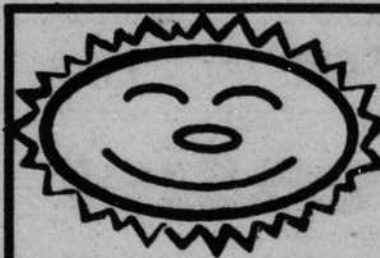

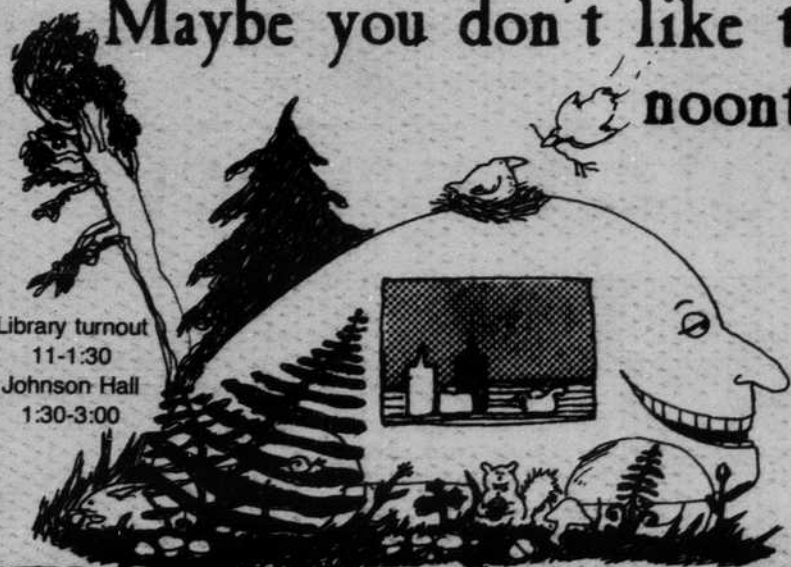


