

Ed college fills dean position

Richard Hersh will become associate dean of teacher education in the University College of Education on July 1. He is currently chairman of secondary education at the University of Toledo, Ohio. "The faculty and I feel extremely fortunate in having been able to attract Dick Hersh to the college," said Dean Robert Gilberts. "His work in teacher education at the University of Toledo has achieved national recognition." The position of associate dean of teacher education was created in 1974 when the College of Education was reorganized. The

duties have been performed in the interim by Dean Gilberts and Robert Schwarz, director of the Center on Human Development, while a search was conducted.

Hersh, 33, has been at Toledo since 1968. His secondary teaching experiences have included social studies teaching in the Winchester and Lexington high schools in Massachusetts.

In 1973, he directed the Robinson School Project, which individualized instruction in an inner city junior high school. The project was funded by the Ohio State Department of Education.

He received a National Teacher Corps grant in 1974 to develop teacher education modules in moral development, a project co-sponsored by the Center for Moral

Education at Harvard University. The same year, he received a Title III grant to research individualizing secondary school instruction.

He visited elementary and secondary schools in the Soviet Union in 1970.

Hersh is the author of three books and more than a dozen articles in professional journals. He holds a doctorate of education from Boston University and bachelor's and master's degrees from Syracuse University.

Hersh was among 225 applicants considered for the position. In his new position, Hersh's salary will be \$28,000.
