Rally for women's rights begins organizing Tuesday

Supporters of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) will meet Tuesday to organize support for a national ERA rally May 16 in Springfield, Ill. Christine Churchill, a Portland feminist, will explain the amendment and answer questions. Susan Arrow will provide musical entertainment. The meeting is scheduled for 12:30 p.m. in the EMU, room to be announced.

The ERA is an amendment to the U.S. Constitution that would eliminate most legal distinction between men and women.

Thirty-four states have ratified the ERA, 38 are needed by 1979 for the amendment to become law. Illinois is considered a key state by supporters of the amendment.

Tuesday's meeting is sponsored by the Young Socialist Alliance, the Women's Studies Student Union and the Sociology 401 Research Group on the ERA.

Oregon ratified the amendment in 1973.

Treasurer candidate at forum

Jewel Lansing, Democrat for state treasurer, will be the speaker at the noon Demo Forum today, at the Colonial Inn. Lunch will be optional.

Lansing, current Multnomah County auditor, business woman, CPA and family woman will be addressing questions regarding the function of the state treasurer's office, ways in which the state can maximize interest and minimize risk, ways in which state public employees can have more say about their retirement monies, a simplified income tax form, and improved financial reporting for the state treasury.

Lansing says she is working to help Oregonians understand the role of the state treasurer and is strong in her praise of former treasurer Robert Straub and current treasurer, Jim Redden.

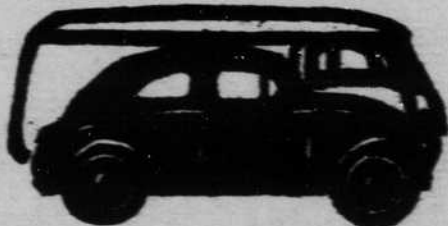
LECTURES

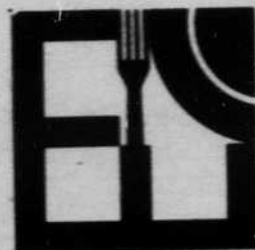
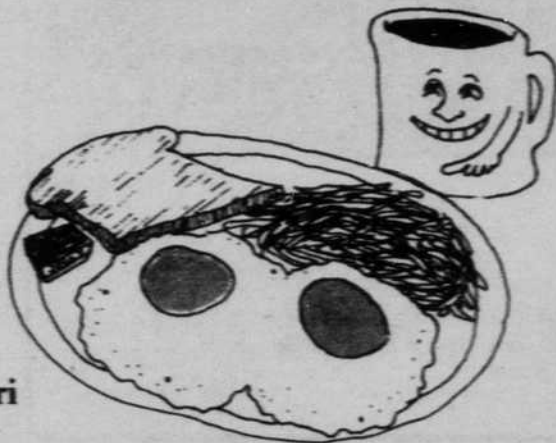
