The L-COG Comprehensive Health Planning Committee is holding the meeting under federal law as part of the review process before the state health commission considers granting approval of the applicants' capital expenditure request for construction of the facility.

The Community Health and

Education Center plans to build the outpatient center at the northwest corner of 10th and Lincoln streets in Eugene. The center seeks to serve a population group that has difficulty in obtaining comprehensive medical and dental care at a reasonable cost, with follow-up and preventive health maintenance.

The public is invited, and comments will be recorded at the meeting.

Topaz will speak at 1 p.m. at the Lane County Fairgrounds on "The Vital Need for Energy Conservation." The speech will be fol-

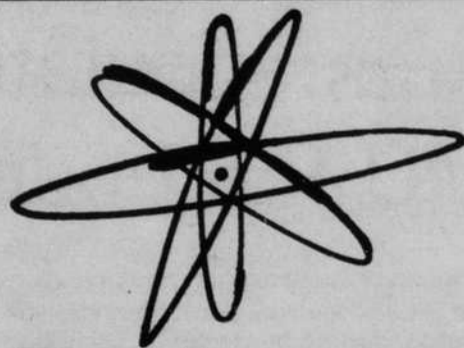
lowed by a display and demonstration by a number of insulation companies.

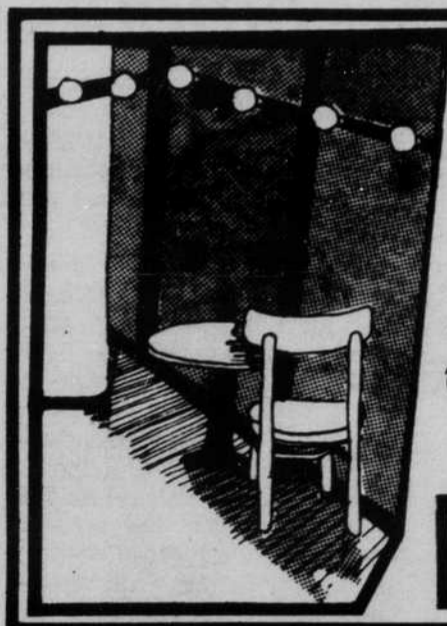
MISCELLANEOUS
