A program of student compositions called "New Works" will be presented at Beall Concert Hall this afternoon at 12:30 p.m. Included will be compositions by students Sharon Everly, Mary Lee Parker, John Wiesenthal, Frederick May, Linda White Birchfield and Michael Golden. The program is free of charge and open to the public.

Sufi lecture series starts

Annemarie Schimmel, professor of Indo-Muslim culture at Harvard University, will be the 1976 Distinguished Visiting Lecturer for the Department of Religious Studies. Professor Schimmel will present a series of free public lectures on mystical dimensions of Islam tomorrow through Thursday.

She is the author of seven books on various aspects of Islam, including a 1975 volume on its mystical dimensions. She has conducted lecture tours in Turkey, Iran, Afghanistan, Pakistan, India, Great Britain, Holland, Switzerland, and the United States.

She will discuss "Sufism: Its Origin and Basic Teachings" on Tuesday. Wednesday she will explain "Jalaluddin Rumi, Sufi: The Apogee of Persian Mystical Poetry," and on Thursday, "Islamic Life and Art under Sufi Influence." All three lectures will be at 7:30 p.m., in the EMU ballroom.

Professor Schimmel has been on the faculty of Harvard University since 1967. She has taught also at the Universities of Marburg and Bonn in Germany, and the University of Ankara in Turkey. She holds a doctorate in philosophy from the University of Berlin.

Profs receive math grant

The University has received a grant of \$15,885 from the Oregon Mathematics Education Council to provide summer salary and benefits for three University faculty members who will be working with the Oregon System in Mathematics Education (OSME) this summer.

Eugene Maier and Donald Rasmussen of the University mathematics department, and David Moursund of the Computing Center, will be working with Oregon mathematics teachers, future teachers and professors.

More than 4,000 Oregon educators have taken part in OSME programs since the five-year program began in 1972. The goal is to give teachers an opportunity to discuss problems, broaden their mathematics understanding, and adapt materials to take back to their classrooms.

Directory free from OSPIRG

The Oregon Student Public Interest Research Group (OSPIRG) has prepared a directory of health services in the Eugene-Springfield area.

The directory compares services and costs of clinics and hospitals in the area. For example, if a person needs a vaccination the directory shows which clinics provide that service and how much it costs at each of them. Or if a woman needs an abortion, the directory tells her where she can go and what she can expect to pay.

A summary of the services available at the Student Health Center is also contained in the directory.

The directory is free and may be picked up at the OSPIRG offices in Suite 3, EMU. OSPIRG will accept complaints dealing with the cost or quality of health services.

All workshops and clinics will offer academic credit. Persons interested in enrolling for credit must file a registration request. Forms may be obtained in the Summer Session Catalog.

Other registration information may be obtained from the Graduate Office, Department of Physical Education.

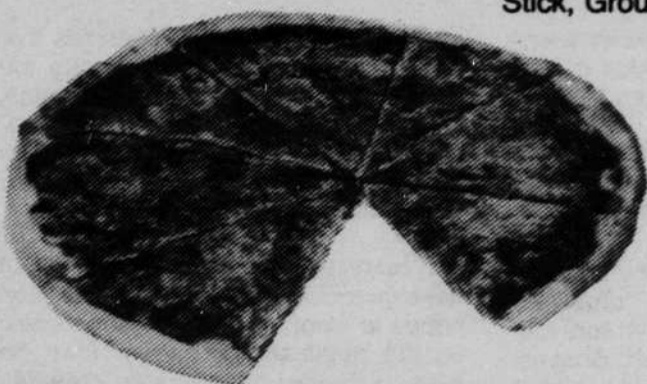
Benefit concert aids scholars
